PROFITABLE FARMING

How does a farmer determine whether his farm is the right size for him with average above average returns? A farmer does not necessarily mean a farmer with the greatest profits. The smaller farms are often more profitable although the trend is towards greater returns on larger units. The farmer making the greatest profits, however, on any size farm will be getting average above average results from his available farm efficiency. These factors can usually be grouped into 5 or 6 categories, namely crop and livestock yields, labor and capital, farm and combination of enterprises or lines of production. First of all, the farm must be big enough to provide enough to keep the available man effectively employed for a whole year. Studies show that it usually requires about 500 acres or a smaller acreage supplemented with live stock to give a family a reasonable standard of living. Gross receipts per man employed should average at least 6,000 to 8,000 dollars.

months of the year, cases of Blue Comb have been encountered in all consumption and increased for water. Birds become inactive and dull, they often congregate around water fountains. The droppings are apt to become loose and have an offensive odor. Egg production, if high, drops suddenly. At times the egg shells become bleached. Birds die suddenly without much loss in weight. Mortality may range up to fifty per cent. Repeated attacks on a given flock have been reported only in frequently. A diagnosis of Blue Comb is not an easy one to establish and is dependent upon a complete history, and Post Mortem examination. SILAGE MA Tasty food is relished the world over. It is not entirely dependent upon the quality of the material used but also on the method of preparation. So it with silage. Stompy, weedy, and poor condition crops, which would not make good hay, can be converted into palatable feed by a process of fermentation. High quality legumes and grasses can be put up in their prime because this method is not too dependent upon favorable weather. To make good silage the material used must have the proper amount of moisture and 70 per cent is excellent. Cut legumes in the early bloom stage. The moisture content will be too high then but can be brought down by adding barley or any other preservative that will absorb the excess moisture. A preservative such as barley provides feed with carbohydrates not available in legume. Mix 75-100 lbs per ton of legumes. Material with the right amount of moisture for silage unfolds gently when pressed into a ball but a more accurate method is using a Forage Crop Moisture Tester. Packing the material down is very important and should continue steadily while the silo is being filled. It should be carried on for four days, preferably daily for one week, after filling operations have ceased. Pack firmly to force air out. Better silage with less danger of combustion results. With today's machines putting up silage is not the muscle binding chore of yesterday. It can be cut with a forage harvester making it easy to put into and take out of the silo. With a front end loader using pick up equipment long material can also be ensiled. Cows getting silage will eat more and produce more than those on dry hay. DO YOU HAVE ANTS Many inquiries have been received for information on how to eliminate ants from lawns and flower beds. Chlordane is a very effective insecticide for this purpose. It may be obtained in an aerosol bomb. A few seconds of spraying with it will be sufficient. Chlordane

may also be obtained as a dust (5 per cent) that can be applied to the ant hill effectively. In either case the worker ants will carry the poison to the queen. Once she is killed no more eggs will be laid and the colony will cease to exist. THE NEW PERTH 4-H CALF CLUB was called to order on July 25th by the vice-president, George Dewar.
