Corporations And Labour Unions Returns Act

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CORPORATIONS AND LABOUR UNIONS RETURNS ACT
(Chapter 26 of the Statutes of Canada 1962)

This Act came into effect on January 1, 1963 and requires that every corporation authorized to carry on business in Canada file a return—either a signed Claim for Exemption or a complete Annual Return—with the Dominion Statistician. The first return under the Act is to be filed not later than October 1, 1963. Failure to comply with the Act's requirements by that date may render a corporation and its officers, directors or agents liable to the penalties provided under Section 6 of the Act. Corporations requiring reporting forms may obtain them by writing to:

Corporations and Labour Unions Returns Act c/o The Dominion Statistician, Ottawa, Canada.
Note: Unincorporated businesses have no reporting obligations under this Act.

CABINET MEETS IN S'SIDE

All-Weather Road Urged For Prince Co. In Brief

SUMMERSIDE — The Town of Summerside presented a four-point brief to the provincial cabinet at the cabinet's weekly meeting, held here yesterday.

This was the first meeting of the provincial executive council in the town since it was incorporated in 1971. The meeting was held in the town council chambers.

Mention was made in the brief of the recent decision to make the Trans-Canada Highway from the Town of Borden to Wood Islands an all weather road, and it was submitted that "from a general economic point of view, the consideration should be given to a similar improvement to the main highway through Prince County from Albany Corner to the western portion of the province."

A request was also submitted that the western highway between Borden's Corner and the town be painted to provide three traffic lanes with direct-traffic signs installed to control driving in the outside lanes and using the center lane for passing only.

It was felt that with the annual increases in vehicular traffic in the province this would help "curtail apparent causes of traffic hazards."

The town also requested that the government consider the immediate planning and engineering requirements to seal and pave both the Pope and Green roads.

INDUSTRIAL SITES
The area fronting the Pope Road was utilized for industrial purposes the brief said, and numerous industries were situated in this area. It was anticipated that the area fronting the Green Road would be

utilized for similar industrial sites.
A final submission was made in regards to the planned diversion of Water Street West which will serve the combined improvement purposes of eliminating a double curve hazard in addition to a wider highway.

The brief read "and as the economic situation in Prince is now at a very low ebb, it is further submitted that an early start be made on the project."

It was also requested that the widening should be planned from a point situated on Water Street, near the west end railway crossing along the existing sea wall to meet the planned diversion as at present envisioned.

HOUSING SITE
Following the meeting Hon. Henry Wedge announced that an order-in-council had gone through deeding the property east of the experimental farm in Summerside as a site for senior citizen housing units.

This land, he said, had been located at no cost for the erection of these homes. Mr. Wedge said the federal government had a 99-year lease on the land and upon request from the provincial government, the lease had been extended.

The site has been approved by Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation and there is sufficient land for the erection of some 38 units. He added that it is anticipated that these units will be erected this fall.

Last evening the cabinet members attended a reception and dinner given by the Mayor and town council. Mayor Morrison presented the cabinet members with token gifts in appreciation of their visit.

Prior to the reception the members inspected the fish packing plant being erected on Queen's Wharf for Island Packers.

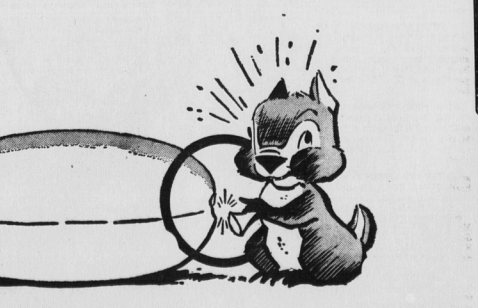
