

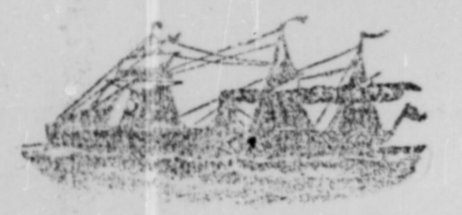

**ST. JOHN EXHIBITION.**

The competition at the St. John Exhibition is reported to be exceptionally strong this year, as the numbers in attendance are unprecedentedly large. It comes not only from the three Maritime Provinces, but from Quebec as well. Senator Cochran is a strong exhibitor in the shorthorn class of cattle; and there are other noted exhibitors in the various classes. A magnificent lot of French coach horses, from a breeding establishment in Maine attracts a great deal of attention. Under the circumstances, the prizes won will be exceptionally valuable; for they may be accepted as proof of great merit on the part of the animals and articles to which they refer. We heartily congratulate the successful P. E. Island exhibitors. Their success reflects credit not only upon themselves but upon their Province.

**THE TRANSVAAL CASE.**

One of our contemporaries quoted, a day or two ago, with apparent approval, the statement of Hon. Israel Tarte that "the Boers' position is ridiculous and impossible from a Canadian point of view. "What," he added, "would happen if the colony of French-Canadians in the Canadian North-West were to be refused the right to vote? They would be up in arms at once, and rightly so?" A moment's consideration will satisfy any one that there is no relevancy between the case of French-Canadians in Canada and that of the Uitlanders in the Transvaal. The former are in their own country; the latter are alien residents of a foreign republic which has the right, under certain conditions, to self-government. The flippant "master of the administration" would put Great Britain in the wrong. As foreigners, merely, the British have no rights in the Transvaal. But the case rests equitably and firmly upon the engagement of the Transvaal to grant the Uitlanders equal privileges in the country, and the failure of President Kruger and his fellows to make good their bargain. The convention of 1881, which gave the Transvaal Republic self-government, expressly states that it is "subject to the suzerainty of her majesty." The Transvaal delegates, Kruger, Pretorius and Joubert, accepted this condition on behalf of the Republic, and it was subsequently ratified at a special meeting of the Volksraad. When submitting the convention to the Volksraad, President Kruger said: "From the peace treaty honorable gentlemen will see that a considerable part of the settlement of affairs in this country, has been delegated to a royal commission. I frankly express my perfect trust that this royal commission will finally and in all respects complete the work of justice so nobly commenced on the 21st and 23rd March last." The following is an extract from the official report of the royal commission here referred to:—

239. The Chairman (Sir H. Robinson).—Had British subjects free trade throughout the Transvaal before the annexation?

240. Mr. Kruger.—They were on the same footing as the burghers. There was not the slightest difference, in compliance with the provisions of Zand river.

241. The Chairman.—I think you will have no objection to allowing that to continue so?

242. Mr. Kruger.—No; there will be equal protection for everyone.

243. Sir E. Wood.—And equal privileges?

244. Mr. Kruger.—We make no distinction in so far as burghers' rights are concerned. There might, perhaps, be some small difference in the case of a young person who has just come into the country.

Dr. Jorissen, the Transvaal State At-

torney, thought the last words of Mr Kruger were calculated to make "a bad impression," and at a subsequent meeting of the commission he drew special attention to them, adding: "What Mr. Kruger wanted to say was this: 'According to our law a new arrival does not immediately receive his burgher right.' The word 'young person' does not refer to age, but to the time of residence in the Transvaal. According to our old Grondwet (constitution) one was required to remain one year in the country."

The agreement so entered into has been deliberately and grossly violated. Uitlanders have not been placed on the same footing as the Boers. They have had to bear the brunt of exceptional taxation and practically they have been denied every political right and privilege. In these circumstances they have appealed to the British Government, and the British Government has interfered to secure the fulfilment of the agreement. That is the whole case; and it is so strong that it justifies the British Government in the use of all the resources of civilization, even to the point of war, to constrain President Kruger and those whom he represents, to honestly make good their agreement.
