OUR HOMES.

The Rev. Mr. Miller, last night at Christian Church, gave an address on the subject of "Our Homes." He said there never was a time in the history of our land, when the children so much needed the parental care as today. Fathers in this bustling and busy world of ours, are neglecting the future welfare of their sons. Never was the child so separated from the parent as to-day. It is one thing to be a parent, another thing to be a friend and companion of the child.

Parents are forgetful of their children's manhood and womanhood. How many parents there are who, when they leave the house to go down town to trade, tell Willie or Eva that if they will be good until papa or mamma returns, she will bring them some candy. The mother returns, forgetting the candy. Evacries. Mamma tells her, very emphatically, if she does not be still she will be "clapped." The child loses confidence in the mother. Mothers, you had better burn your bread from the confidence of the child. How do the people of the land expect to bring about temperance reform when they are forgetting the very ones whom they ought to look after? The children strike the blow at home, not the saloon. Husbands, you must make a vow on marriage day, before Almighty God, that you love your wife and protect her. Now, stay at home at night, carry out the vow, get better acquainted with your wife and child. Bring your children to Christ. First reconcile yourself with your Saviour. When there are no patrons there are no saloons. If we have enough of Christ, we need no saloons. Spend an hour now and then telling the child of the home and of Christ. Tell them the benefits of honesty and morality. Be sure you have these principles yourself. Men, vote as you pray, and you will have what you want, temperance. The world for Christ and Christ for the world. Our hope is in the rising generation. So, fathers and mothers, strengthen the chain of love that binds the children to the parents, by being their companions. Mr. Miller has been requested to repeat the address at some future date.

SILVERMINE, Pa., Oct 9.—A fire to-day in shaft No 1 of the Lanke Fidler colliery caused by the careless use of a lamp, cost the lives of five miners, and probably many months of idleness to 900 employees. Irving Bluffington, the man who carried a naked lamp was suffocated and four others are shut in the mine beyond all hope of rescue. Fifty other workmen had thrilling escapes through dense smoke and deadly gases. Two were overcome but their comrades carried them to the surface. The flames cannot be fought with any success because of the clouds of gas and smoke arising from the burning mine. It has been decided to drown out the fire, but it will require six weeks to fill the inside with water. Operations cannot be resumed at this mine for at least two years. Its pay roll averages \$25,000 a month.
