

Local Government Finances.

We clip the following from the Patriot of Thursday:—

"To the Editor of the Presbyterian. "SIR,—I observe in the last issue of your paper, under the heading of 'Facts for the Electors of Belfast,' the following:—

"That the late Provincial Auditor, Mr. Frederick W. Hyndman, prepared a statement showing that the actual deficit for 1878 was \$73,864."

"I must inform you that your statement is incorrect. I never prepared any such document, and I may add that it was impossible that I could do, as no such deficit existed."

HONORS TO SIR JOHN MACDONALD!

A Magnificent Banquet in Quebec!

(From the Moncton Times.)

The dinner tendered to Sir John A. Macdonald by the Conservatives of Quebec on the occasion of his return from England after being sworn in as a member of Her Majesty's Privy Council, took place at the Music Hall, in Quebec City, last evening. Sir John, accompanied by Hon. Hector Langevin and Mr. Plumb, arrived at Quebec on Tuesday evening, and have since been the guests of Mr. Caron, M. P. Sir Charles Tupper proceeded from Halifax to Quebec on Tuesday to take part in the demonstration. A Quebec despatch says:— "The decorations were evidently the work of skilled hands, so artistic and beautiful was the effect. The tables were arranged with a view to make the most of the space, without sacrificing appearance. Suspended in the centre of the stage were the arms of Sir John Macdonald, between a French and Irish flag, surrounded by the Union Jack and Dominion Ensign. Over this was the motto, "Welcome to the Chieftain," in English and French. The other mottoes were, on one gallery, "Success to the National policy," and on the other, "Nos institutions notre langue et nos lois;" while over the band who occupied that portion of the gallery facing the stage, were the words, "God Save the Queen."

"At half-past nine the ladies arrived and were received by the gentlemen with enthusiastic cheers, and whose presence, enhanced by their rich and varied costumes, completed the beauty of a scene unsurpassed in the annals of Quebec. "The chairman, Hon. P. Garneau, then proposed the toast "Our Guest," the Right Hon. Sir John A. Macdonald, K. C. B. He said he was sure they were all happy to welcome their Right Hon. friend on the occasion of his being sworn in as Her Majesty's Privy Councillor of Great Britain; an honor she had never before conferred on a Canadian, but honor well earned and well merited by him. Judging from the number then present he supposed the next time they gave a dinner to Sir John A. Macdonald, they would have to give it at Dufferin Terrace. He then proposed the toast, which was received with the most enthusiastic cheers.

"Sir John A. Macdonald, who was received with great enthusiasm, expressed the great emotion he felt at receiving such a demonstration in this old city, in which a quarter of a century ago he had first taken office in Canada. His speech, which occupied an hour and a quarter in delivery; owing to the late hour, could not be given this evening.

"The following toasts were then proposed by the Chairman— "Her Majesty's Ministers."

"Our Sister Provinces," with which was coupled the name of Sir Charles Tupper.

"In reply to the toast, 'The Legislature of Quebec,' Hon. J. A. Chapleau, Leader of the Opposition in the Local Legislature, rose and was received with tremendous cheers. The next toast was 'Our Industries.' Mr. Dobell returned thanks on behalf of those engaged in the various industrial interests of the country.

"After this the following toasts were proposed and suitably responded to:—'Our Conservative Clubs,' by Mr. Mantel, president of the 'Club Cartier' of Montreal; 'The Ladies,' and 'The Press.'"
