

CHARLOTTETOWN VS. SUMMERSIDE.

THE LATTER WIN BOTH OF THE HOCKEY MATCHES.

The Senior's Defeat the Victorias by 4-0
The Stars Win From the Crescents by 5-4.

Two interesting Hockey Matches were played at the Rink last night, one between the Victorias and the Senior Summerside team and the other between the Stars and the Crescents. The ice at the first was in splendid condition but towards the close of the evening it became very soft. The play in both of the matches was very fast and at times it became furious, but not one of the four teams showed any combination whatever and it is combination that tells. In the first half of the senior match the Summerside men made three goals. In the second half they scored another, but the Victorias failed to send the puck once through their opponents' goal-posts. During the game McKie and Compton of the Summerside team each broke one of their skates and this in both cases caused long delays which were very trying to the spectators but were pleasingly relieved by the specialties of Charlie Van-Bu-kirk and some of the small boys. Cecil Stewart received a bad crack on the eye. In the Stars-Crescents match both teams went in to win but the Stars came, played and conquered, and they conquered fairly and in a sportsmanlike manner. Play had only commenced for a short time in the first half before the Stars scored their first goal, then the Crescents took three goals in succession and before half time S'ide scored again. In the second half the Stars scored twice and the Crescents once, thus making the total score 5 to 4. Mr. L. B. McMillan made an exceptionally good referee and was bounced by the Summerside team. The behavior of some of the young men of Charlottetown after the match was over was anything but that of gentlemen.

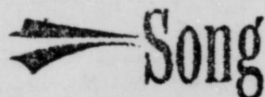

The late Signor Nicolini left the sum of £20,000 to his widow, Adeline Patti, and to his three children by his first marriage. Madame Patti, however has renounced the legacy.

The French-Canadian Liberals of Montreal propose to erect a monument to the late Premier Mercier, of Quebec, at a cost of \$20,000. The contract will be given to Mr. Hebert, the well-known French-Canadian sculptor.

The Queen seems to be enjoying wonderfully good health. She walks better than she did at the time of her jubilee. Later in the afternoon the same day she again went out in an open landau, and took a long drive through Pall Mall, Piccadilly, Hyde Park, Chelsea and Battersea park. On Friday after the drawing room, the Queen drove to Kensington palace, which will shortly be opened to the public and in the evening she gave a large dinner at which the Prince and Princess of Wales, the Duke and Duchess of York and the Duke and Duchess of Fife were present.
