RMA Will Seek Higher Sales Tax Commission

SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN—A resolution of the P.E.I. Division of the Retail Merchants Association approach the provincial government for a higher percentage of commission for collecting the sales tax, was one of five introduced last evening at the annual meeting of the association at Melbrey Lodge in Summerside.

The other four were: that the RMA of P.E.I. investigate the possibility of cheaper fire insurance protection for independent retailers; that every effort be put forward to establish a technical training course for young people wishing to work in retail outlets; that all RMA members support their own RMA hardware; and that the RMA of P.E.I. go on record as opposing the unethical practice of trading stamps and "funny money" coupons.

The afternoon meeting and banquet were presided over by William Ellis, Sherwood, president.

54 SHAREHOLDERS—At the annual report, stated that the RMA hardware wholesale business now has 54 shareholders and the association has about 135 members. He commented on the group as being "most enthusiastic."

"Thirteen years ago," stated the president, "our association was formed because it was urgently needed. String individual businesses found that they were no longer strong enough alone and quite often had been working against one another."

"Our association is working continuously to have trading stamps and funny money coupons completely and finally outlawed. They are something which no business in this province should sponsor or have anything to do with. When a customer offered trading stamps, he should realize that it is not being done for his own good."

Mr. Ellis stated that the RMA has been a driving force behind a great many things which have come about as benefits to retailers. "Things happen," he said, "not of their own promotion but because someone has provided the spark and drive to get them on the way and to take them to a party."

ASS'N SPONSORS SCHOOL

Cerebral Palsy Victims Given Special Training

(Editor's note: This is another in a series of articles concerning organizations taking part in the province-wide United Fund campaign.)

Monday through Friday, six students are hard at work in a different sort of classroom in Charlottetown. Here they progress at their own rate, do subjects in different grades, some coloring, other using building blocks or counters, some knitting.

This is the special class for cerebral palsy children at 67 Filiberto Street, sponsored by the Cerebral Palsy Association of P.E.I., an agency participating in the United Fund and budgeting in the campaign for \$2,852.

The children at the school are very friendly to visitors and enthusiastic about their work. The teacher is paid by the P.E.I. department of education, and the association pays her supplement. The class adheres to the regular school year and curriculum, but because they have special difficulties, they progress more in some subjects and at a slower rate in others. Subjects range from pre-emptive to grade nine science.

One typical student has a speech problem so that reading is hard. In arithmetic he is two grades ahead of reading, and a

The progress of children at this school is also determined by their physical condition at the moment. Many days they are not physically able to do much work.

Play periods are play therapy for the children. One may use a counter or building blocks, another will use a large device with lines to help him in learning to lace his shoes.

Everyone likes music in the class. They make use of the record player and the radio, listening to school broadcasts as they fit into the class program. They hope to have a rhythm band later. Holidays are celebrated at the school, and Halloween or Valentine's day is probably a time to look forward to a party.

The aim of the association is to provide the cerebral palsied child with the best training and rehabilitative treatment possible in order to help him become a happy, useful citizen.
