COMING HOME.

What Will be Done for Them To-Night.

The city is gay with bunting to-day, and everything indicates that the reception to be given the returning soldiers tonight will be on a grand scale.

The Princess is expected to arrive from Pictou about half-past seven o'clock. She will be conveyed by the steamer Stanley, and as she comes up the harbor a salute will be fired from Fort Edward by a detachment of Artillery under command of Captain Bartlett. As the "boys" land at the Steam Navigation Company's wharf the whistle of Bruce Stewart & Co's establishment will be sounded. This will be the signal for the blowing of other whistles and the ringing of bells.

The men will be received by the militia under Col. Moore, and the procession will start in the following order:

- Sons of England.
- Ancient Order of Hibernians.
- Independent Order of Foresters.
- Caledonian Club.
- Benevolent Irish Society.
- The Boys Brigade.
- Contingent with escort of Militia.
- The students of Prince of Wales and St. Dunstan's colleges will form a line on either side carrying torches.

Music will be furnished by the Bands of the Fourth Regiment, League of the Cross, St. Dunstan's College and the Sons of England.

The route of the procession will be along Great George to Richmond Street, thence to Prince Street, up Prince to Kent, along Kent to Queen, down Queen to south side Market Square, where the following programme will be carried out:—

Between the items on the programme to be disposed of on Market Square there will be displays of fireworks from the roofs of the stores in the vicinity.

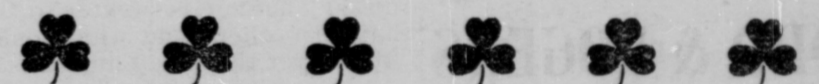

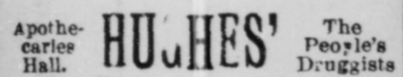
