

Committee Named To Operate, Manage S'ide Civic Stadium

A committee to operate and manage the affairs of the Summerside Civic Stadium was appointed yesterday at a special meeting of the Summerside Town Council. The committee is composed of representatives from the Town Council, Summerside service clubs, Canadian Legion, and Amateur Athletic Association. This committee is under the chairmanship of the finance committee of the Town Council, and includes Councillor Donald Linton as chairman of the property committee of the Council; Clarence Mercer, representing the Canadian Legion; Horace MacFarlane, of the Amateur Athletic Association; Robert Hogg, of the Y's Men's Club; T. Earl Hickey, of the Rotary Club; Charles Hogan, of the Kinsmen Club; and Herbert Schurman of the Lions Club. The duty of this committee will be to operate and manage the affairs of the Civic Stadium on behalf of the Summerside Town Council until a stadium commission can be set up through an amendment to the Summerside Act of Incorporation. In the only other matter dealt with at the meeting, the council approved the purchase of land from John Arthur for the sum of \$1,800. This land, reportedly containing about two acres, is located north of Harvard Street in the vicinity of the oil tanks, and may be used by the town as a site for the relocation of the town-owned abattoir. The council meeting, held at five o'clock yesterday afternoon, was presided over by Mayor Edgewood, and present were Councillors Dr. H. E. Clark, William Jenkins, Andrew Perry, Donald Linton, Edgar Cannon, Town manager Joseph Brophy, and town clerk John E. Cameron.

Car Out Of Control Crashes Into Barber Shop At O'Leary

A car driven by Wesley Boulter of O'Leary went out of control Tuesday evening and crashed through the front of a small building on the south side of Main Street, O'Leary causing heavy damage to both car and building. The structure which housed Thompson's Barber Shop, was hit with sufficient force to knock it off its foundations as the '53 Ford crashed full length inside, knocking over the barber chair, stove, smashing the large mirror and other barbering equipment. Fortunately no one was in the shop at the time. The driver of the car was not injured.

Livestock Killed Yesterday In Thunder Storm At Freetown

Yesterday morning at 11.30 o'clock a short lived but severe electric storm passed over the vicinity of Freetown, killing two horses and a bull in the barnyard of Mr. Truman Paynter. The horses were being used at the time to haul bales of straw into the loft by rope lift and both were instantly killed. The bull was tied up inside the barn and the bolt of lightning caused no other damage to the barn except a slight burning of the rafters. At the nearby farm of Mr. Edgar Reeves, where men were engaged in threshing operations, the bolt passed through the blower pipe causing the straw in the pipe to ignite and it then followed through to the loft, escaping through an upper window. The fire in the blower pipe was extinguished before it made any headway.

Fisheries Cases Heard Yesterday In Alberton Court

An Alberton South fisherman was fined \$30.00 and costs or 10 days in jail by Magistrate R.S. Hinton at Alberton yesterday for possession of lobsters in an area where fishing for such fish is prohibited under the fishery regulations. A Milminegash fisherman was convicted and fined \$15.00 and costs for retaining undersized lobsters and two Tignish fishermen received fines of \$10.00 and costs and \$15.00 and costs respectively, under similar charges. A resident of Bloomfield and one from Pleasant View were convicted under the Temperance Act with possession of liquor not purchased from a vendor (moonshine) and fined \$25.00 and costs each. A man from Springfield West was fined \$100.00 and costs for driving while impaired. Under the Highway Traffic Act a party from Bloomfield was fined \$5.00 and costs for driving without a license and a party from St. Louis was also fined \$5.00 and costs for using a number plate on a vehicle other than the one for which it was issued. A party from Tignish, charged with assault, was bound over to keep the peace for one year.

Will Mark 125th Anniversary Of Congregation At Alberton

On Sunday, September 16th, Alberton congregation will celebrate the 125th anniversary of its founding. Services of public worship will be conducted by the minister, Rev. Murray Gardner, at 11 a.m. and 8 p.m. In the morning music will be by the church choir and in the evening by Dr. Peter MacDonald and his choir from Crapaud. The edifice in which the congregation worships each Sunday is classed with those of historic significance in Canada. Erected one hundred years ago, it is an inheritance from the Presbyterian Church in Canada which in 1825 entered into union with the Methodist Church in Canada to form the United Church of Canada. As early as 1826 occasional services were conducted in Alberton by Rev. William McGregor of Richmond Bay, Rev. R. S. Patterson of Bedouque, Rev. John Keir, of Princetown, and Rev. Hugh Dunbar of Cavendish. On July 20, 1831 the following named heads of fourteen families organized the Alberton Presbyterian congregation. Alexander Bell, John Forsyth James Forsyth, John Gordon, Robert Hardy, William Hardy, John Hewitt, William Warren, James Wells and John Wells. FIRST ELDERS In 1835 the first elders were ordained by Rev. John Keir. They were John Gordon, father of the Eromanga martyrs, Robert Gordon of Cascumpec, James Forsyth of Alberton, Robert Hardy of Kildare, and Charles Craswell of Cascumpec. About the time these elders were ordained a small church was built near what is now the Old Dock Cemetery and it served as a place of worship for almost twenty years. In 1854 a larger building

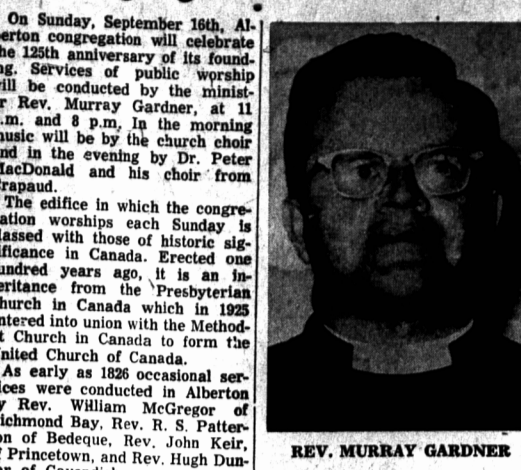

Hospital Needs Stressed To Summerside Kinsmen

Mr. John Legerwood, administrator of the Prince County Hospital was the guest speaker on Tuesday evening at the opening meeting of the Summerside Kinsmen Club. Mr. Legerwood's talk outlined the problems facing the Board of Trustees of the Prince County Hospital in their efforts to contend with the increasing financial burden and at the same time to operate the hospital so that it may fulfill its prime objective the care of the sick. "It must be common knowledge," he said, "to all residents that the Prince County Hospital is facing very real financial difficulties and it would be convenient if the solution were to be found in addressing your own and other service organizations who would reach into the treasury or even the community's resources to relieve the hospital of that financial obligation. However our problems and the problems of hospitals generally will not be solved in quite that easy fashion." He said that the problem was not having kept the public and particularly the Government fully informed about hospital affairs. "We have been loath," said Mr. Legerwood to even discuss our financial requirements, let alone our achievements. RESOURCES He said that the hospital system has outrun a basic principle upon which all voluntary, non-profit hospitals were originally founded, that being that a reasonable proportion of the community's resources that care and treatment were available to serve those who were unable to provide for themselves, while it has of necessity retained that other basic principle to provide for the sick and injured, regardless of ability to pay. "Prince County Hospital," he said "is one of the basic utilities of this area. It serves the town of Summerside and Kensington and surrounding districts. It is in addition the only educational institution in the county that provides professional training for our younger citizens. Not only its existence but its continued progress is vital to the welfare of many thousands of citizens. PUBLIC SUPPORT He pointed out that the Prince County Hospital can continue to serve only so long as it has the goodwill and support of the public for that is the key and the cornerstone to the voluntary, non-profit hospital's continued existence. Mr. Legerwood said that it was the concern of the hospital trustees to remove the apathy that exists and to engender public enthusiasm into the hospital system. In his discussion of many of the problems facing non-profit hospitals today he said that some of the factors involved were, the demands of an ever increasing population for modern hospital care stimulated by government pressure to increase and improve hospital plans increased operating costs. INCREASING COSTS He pointed out that the daily cost of caring and treating a patient during the period 1946-1955 has increased 135 per cent, "due," he said, "to payroll increases, care and treatment of those who are without funds, increased unpaid patient accounts and various other factors." Mr. Legerwood concluded his talk by saying that over 4,000 patients are now admitted almost double the admissions of 1946. "It is our earnest desire that you as citizens will want to know more about the detailed operation of our hospital and during the next few weeks the Board of Trustees will place its story before the public. You will be the judge and jury and you will reach a fair and just verdict. Chairman of the meeting was James Harris and the speaker was introduced to the Kinsmen by Norman Hogg. The meeting was turned over to the incoming president, Dr. A.J. Dolron. Finesmaster was Harry Dye.
