NATIONAL DIVISION.—The National Division of North America opens in Association Hall, Ocean Grove, New Jersey, on Wednesday, July 9, at 10 a. m. It is expected that the different provinces and states will be well represented.

Mrs. Macdonald is the eldest daughter of the late Angus McIntyre, Cable Head, and is a sister of His Lordship Bishop McIntyre. She was born at Naufrage, Lot 43, on the 17th June, 1790. Her husband died about forty-three years ago. Mrs. Macdonald has eight of her family yet living—four sons and four daughters. Her eldest son, D. J. Macdonald, is seventy-six years of age. Up to the last few months Mrs. Macdonald could knit and sew with comparative ease, as her eyesight was remarkably good.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, June 13. The new extradition treaty is gazetted. The German Government having complied with the requirements of the Imperial Merchant's Shipping Act, German certificates of tonnage are hereafter to be accepted in all the British ports.

The following articles have been placed on the Customs free list: Hatters' bands, bindings and linings, when imported by hat manufacturers for use in their factory, and Indian corn of varieties known as Southern White Dent Corn and Western Yellow Dent Corn when imported for sowing and ensilage. John P. Chipman, of Kentville, has been appointed County Court Judge, vice Blanchard deceased.

Presbyterian Assembly. OTTAWA, June 13.

The Assembly resumed business this morning. Fourteen ministers ask leave to retire. Truro presbytery asked to have Mr. Wylie's name transferred from St. John presbytery to that of Truro. Granted. Rev. R. Laing is to have his name retained on the roll of Halifax presbytery. A deputation from the Methodist Conference was heartily received by the Assembly. They gave fraternal addresses, showing that the Methodist Church wishes to stand side by side with the Presbyterian Church and tried to shape its course in harmony. The Moderator replied in an appropriate speech. A discussion took place on the formation of Young Men's Missionary Societies, and a recommendation was adopted in favor of such societies. On invitation of the Assembly, Rev. C. B. Pitblado, amidst applause, took his seat on the platform. Foreign missions took up the evening.

Montreal Harbor Improvements. OTTAWA, June 13.

John Page, chief engineer of the railways and canals department, and Mr. Coste, acting chief engineer of public works, who were recently appointed as a provisional commission to report on the plans for the proposed Montreal harbor improvements, have submitted a report to the Government. They reach the conclusion that another commission should be appointed for the purpose of gathering information, before any plan is adopted. It is not likely that the harbor improvements will be undertaken this season.

A Terrible Accident. HALIFAX, June 13.

James Hunter, of Westville, N. S., was killed at the railway crossing at Pictou today. He was a witness in the Robertson manslaughter case and was attending the Supreme Court to give evidence. He ran along the track to jump on the morning cars, he got his hand upon the rails of the cars but failed to reach the step. He was awung around and his brains were dashed out.

Left in Disgust. MONTREAL, June 3.

At a great political meeting here this evening, called by the Government candidate, Premier Mercier failed to get a hearing, and left the hall in disgust. Mr. Beauregard, Independent Liberal, captured the meeting.

A Compromise Made. COLUMBUS, O., June 13.

The striking street car men accepted the proposition of the Consolidated Company, and will return to work at the compromise scale of \$170 for conductors, and \$160 for drivers.

British Parliament. LONDON, June 13.

In the House of Commons this evening, the debate continued on the Licensing Bill. A long discussion was had on Ackland's proposal to apply the Compensation Fund to education. The proposal was rejected, 275 to 243.
