200 Accepted In Training Plan

Frank Ashmole of the National Employment Service office in Charlottetown said this morning that approximately 200 men and women had been accepted for program 5 of the federal-provincial training agreement.

Mr. Ashmole said that this program was designed for training and retraining the unemployed and underemployed, and has been operating for the past couple of years. He said the numbers of people taking training under the program has continued to increase each year and already training facilities at the Provincial Vocational Institute for this program were becoming taxed.

The program, he said, is chiefly for persons with a minimum of a grade 10 education but a special basic training course designed to provide additional training in science, mathematics and English for those with below grade ten education. It also provides and many take advantage of this course.

Program 5 provides and comfortable living allowance for single and married persons taking the course and thus provides opportunity for people who could not formerly take training courses because they had to support themselves and sometimes families. The allowance offered is \$35 a week for a single person \$48 for a person with one dependent, \$55 for two dependants and \$63 for three dependants. If the person is from outside the area where the course is given and must board, and additional \$15 allowance to cover the cost of boarding is given.

Thirty-three women, most of them single girls, although there are some married women, are enrolled in three courses. The majority are in commercial art, with a few in beauty-culture and two in commercial art. The remainder of the students are men, many of whom are married, and the twelve courses offered for men include welding, plumbing, sheet metal work, mechanics and so on.

Two Premiers Will Meet With Maine Governor

AUGUSTA, Me. (AP)—Governor John H. Reed said today he is inviting the premiers of New Brunswick and Quebec to Augusta, probably in late October, to discuss mutual problems and plans of the three neighboring jurisdictions.

The governor said he reached agreement with Premier Louis Robichaud of New Brunswick in conversations on Campobello Island during President Johnson's visit there last weekend. Premier Daniel Johnson of Quebec will be invited, Reed said, and a mutually agreeable date will be arranged, possibly this week.

Leading topics, Reed told a press conference, will be the possibility of a corridor road through Maine to link the two provinces and the development of airline service between Maine and the provinces, primarily between Montreal and Portland.

Asians Try New Type Nationalism

BANFF, Alta. (CP) — Asian countries are finding it necessary to build a new kind of "second-stage nationalism," the Banff conference on world development was told Monday. Dr. William Holland, director of the department of Asian studies at the University of British Columbia, told the opening session of the conference that traditional nationalism based on the fight for independence from colonial powers no longer is good enough in Asia.

He said the "jailbird generation" of national leaders — so-called because these leaders often spent years in the jails of the colonial powers during independence struggles — originally won and held the loyalty of their people through their role in the independence movement. But now that independence has been a fact most areas for more than a decade, the search is on for new symbols of leadership and a new nationalism.

Both the second generation of leaders and the remaining members of the jailbird generation are seeking these new symbols.

Dr. Holland said Indonesia probably has gone farther than any other Asian country in seeking the new symbols, new slogans and new ideologies of second-stage nationalism.
