## SUMMERSIDE NOTES.

(From the Progress.)  
Mr. Donald Gillis' loss by fire, near Kensington on last Friday week, was about \$2,000; Mr. Keesley's about \$600.  
There is to be a trot on Summerside Driving Park, on the 5th day of September next, between John Ronnaghan's stallion, Abdallah Messinger and Angus McInnis' stallion, French Lion, for the sum of one hundred dollars a side, mile heats, best two in three, in harness.  
On Thursday evening last a meeting was held in Montgomery's Hall for the purpose of organizing a volunteer night-watch. David Rogers, Esq., occupied the chair, and explained the purpose of the meeting. A number of gentlemen then gave their names as willing to take their turn nightly in watching the town. The watch will be divided into parties of two, and each party will be notified when their watch night will come.

## News of the World.

**UNITED STATES.**  
A lady from Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, now sojourning in Brooklyn, is accompanied by three sons, aged 14 years. They are triplets, and two are so much alike as to deceive strangers in the matter of their identity.  
SAN FRANCISCO, June 20.—News from a Rocky Mountain camp of the Canadian Pacific Railway states that the men in charge there were murdered by the Blackfoot Indians. One man escaped to Fraser River. A large amount of railway supplies was at the camp.  
NEWBURGH, N. J., June 20.—Locusts are damaging young fruit. At Marlborough on one farm several acres of grapes have been destroyed. Large numbers of peach trees have also been attacked.  
CANADA.  
OTTAWA, June 21.—A meeting of the Privy Council was held this morning with regard to a press despatch, received this morning, announcing the murder of a Rocky Mountain camp of the Canada Pacific Survey. It is stated that no such camp exists, and as the Government have received no intimation of any such occurrence, the statement must be accepted with considerable reserve, pending the arrival of fuller and more reliable information.  
PROVINCE OF NOVA SCOTIA.  
PEROU, June 21.—At a Roman Catholic temperance picnic held here to day, a silver ice pitcher offered for competition between Sir John Macdonald and Mr. Mackenzie, was won by Sir John Macdonald by 920 votes.  
SOUTH AMERICA.  
The fuller reports received of the South American earthquakes which occurred in the spring, show these convulsions of nature to have been attended with great and unusual loss of life and property. Eleven towns were nearly all destroyed, six hundred lives were lost, and the estimated destruction of property is \$20,000,000. The effect of the earthquakes was felt all along the coast of Peru and Chili, from Callao to Coquimbo. The damage done to wharves and launches will seriously interfere with the shipping of guano. The losses are greater than those which attended the earthquakes of 1868. Inasmuch as a town in the interior was totally destroyed, the theory in Peru is that the disturbance of the earth was subterranean and not submarine, and that the centre of the earthquake was the volcano Inga, on the southern boundary of Peru and Bolivia, in Callao the panic among the inhabitants was great, hundreds of people fleeing to Lima by rail.  
ROME.  
ROME, June 20.—The Pope refuses the request of the French Legationists to instruct the Roman Catholic Clergy in France to adopt a policy in concert with the French Ministry, basing the refusal on the ground of non-interference by the Vatican in France's domestic policy.
