the TB control programme, it is an essential activity.
Rehabilitation
He noted that opportunities for placing in gainful employment trained ex-patients in this Province are very limited, especially when the ex-patient's work tolerance is considered. However, he said the incidence of relapses has

been encouragingly small.
Major Hodson asked if it were considered advisable to continue x-raying children under 12 years of age. He said they now constituted 30 per cent of the number being x-rayed. He offered a suggestion that it not be done unless the children were accompanied by one or both of their parents who themselves were x-rayed. He said it was absolutely essential that "we get the older people."

A delegate from Georgetown cited similar conditions there and in noting the difficulty encountered asked if x-raying should be made compulsory. She thought there were a lot of older people afraid of being x-rayed.
Major Hodson introduced a chart showing admissions to the Sanatorium by age groups since 1948. It indicated that the two largest groups were in the age classes 15 to 29 and the 40 and over group. In all there were 689 admitted with 92 being 14 or younger, 321 from 15 to 29, 107 from 30 to 39 and 174 who were 40 or over. In the younger groups up to 29 years old there were more females but after age 40 most of them were men.
