THE steamer M. A. Starr, Capt. Ferguson, arrived from Halifax at 3.45 this morning with a cargo of general merchandise and Messrs. D. J. Stewart and M. Macdonald as passengers. She sails on return at five o'clock this afternoon, with a cargo of cattle and produce and three passengers—one lady and two gentlemen.

WE learn that the steamer City of St. John, Capt. Forbes, plying between Halifax and Yarmouth, put into Liverpool, N. S., with a broken shaft on Tuesday morning, and at latest accounts was waiting for the steamer Alpha to tow her to Halifax. Capt. Forbes was in command of the Edgar Stewart when she was lost on Gull Rock last year.

LIEUT. POLLARD, of the Gospel Army, has been promoted to a Captaincy. He left the city to-day for Calais, where he will go into active service. Capt. Bartlett and a number of soldiers met at the Station this morning to bid their comrade good-bye. This makes the third officer sent out in the work of the Gospel Army from P. E. Island. Staff Captain Herbert, D. O., will, it is expected, leave Calais for Charlottetown on arrival of Capt. Pollard, and will probably reach Charlottetown on Saturday evening.

Rev. Mr. Scott officiated. The wedding presents were costly, handsome and numerous. The gallant Captain and his bride left on the afternoon train for the West, to join his ship, which sails to-day for England, followed by the good wishes and congratulations of their many friends. THE stores of Owen Connolly, Esq., on Queen Street, were entered by burglars last night. An entrance into the building was effected by breaking the lower panel of a door in the rear of the principal store. A panel in the door leading from the back of the shop to the office was next broken and an entrance to the office thus effected. The drawers of the desk in the office were broken open and searched, but so far as known nothing was carried off. The upper portion of the door leading from the office to the principal store is of glass, a large plate of which was broken through which the burglars obtained access to the store where they searched the tills and turned out things about considerably, but did not carry off anything so far as known. From the principal store they went to the adjoining one, through a glass slide, and amused themselves fishing around the tills and shelves with indifferent success. As soon as the burglary was discovered, the City Marshal was notified, and he went carefully over the scene, discovering a clue which he thinks will lead to the arrest and conviction of the guilty parties.

A BUXTON Salvation Army soldier got into difficulties with some young men, and was prohibited by the Captain from going on the saved platform with the other soldiers. This ruffled her usually placid temper, and with a peculiar display of Christian toleration she had a young man, whom she accused of assaulting her on Sunday night last, arraigned before the Stipendiary Magistrate to-day. The plaintiff was placed upon the stand and took the oath with considerable unctuousness. She stated that on Sunday evening last, about twenty minutes to ten, after the services of the army had been concluded, she left the barracks for her residence. On her way she was accosted by two young men, one of whom actually had the audacity to catch her by the arm. The young man walked along, one on each side of her and amused themselves by trying to push her off the sidewalk as well as by using language which she considered indecent and which jarred greatly upon her usually sensitive organism. She only knew one of the young men and consequently only had one summoned. The defendant on oath denied the charge brought against him. Several witnesses, among whom were two soldiers of the Army, and the young man's companion, testified that beyond the fact of the woman being "seen home" by the two young men there was no more truth whatever in her story. The Magistrate, after allowing that he was disgusted with the whole affair, dismissed the case.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Orangemen on the Rampage.

BELFAST, Ire., June 10.

Heavy rioting took place here on Tuesday night, Orangemen being the participants. One hundred houses were wrecked and two burned down. Many run-shops were broken into and sacked, the contents appropriated and drunk and the drunken mob then marched around shouting "To Hell with the Pope!" Twenty-five people were wounded by bullets.

The rioting was renewed last night with increased violence. The riot act was read, and the mob stoned the police, who replied with their revolvers, killing four persons, one of whom was a spectator, a barmaid, who was looking out of a tavern window at the disturbance. The mob returned the fire, and a brisk fusillade was kept up for twenty minutes. Later on in the evening the mob drove a force of 150 policemen into their barracks and then attacked the buildings, firing revolvers and paving stones. The police fired a volley killing five more persons. Several Protestant clergymen tried to disperse the mob, but their efforts were unavailing.

DUBLIN, June 10.

One hundred and fifty policemen left the city last night for Belfast to reinforce the police force there. Troops have also been called out.

Preparing for the Campaign.

LONDON, June 10.

The Hartington Whigs are everywhere uniting with the Tories in preparation for the electoral campaign. Labouchere is forming a new party of those Radicals who are opposed to Chamberlain, and they will throw off his leadership.

Chamberlain is organizing a new Radical caucus, the headquarters of which are to be at Birmingham.

Parliament will be dissolved on the 26th inst.

Gladstone is in excellent health and is ready for the battle.

Collision and Abandonment.

NORTH SYDNEY, June 10.

The barquentine Electra from Cadiz for Quebec, was run into by the steamer Galia during a thick fog on the southern edge of the banks at daylight, on May 31st, and was seriously damaged. The Galia towed the Electra one hundred miles then cut the hawser and left.
