Arson Case Is Adjourned In Co. Magistrate's Court

Five young men in their late teens and early twenties appeared before Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet in County Magistrate's Court on Friday afternoon on two separate charges. The charges laid against the five were that they did wilfully and without legal justification set fire to a garage owned by Jack MacIntyre of Milton, thereby committing the indictable offence of arson. The second charge was that they did wilfully and without legal justification commit damage to certain real property, to wit nine windows in the Milton Public School.

Four other youths, all residents of North Rustico, were arraigned in court on charges laid by a Wheatley River man. The charges arose out of a fight in the Junior Farmer's Recreation Hall in New Glasgow on October 21st.

Three of the accused were charged with causing a disturbance in a public place by fighting while the fourth was charged with using obscene language in a public place. Evidence was given by the complainant against one of the accused charged with fighting. The case against the four youths was adjourned to Friday, November 7th.

Two men, residents of Rustico-ville and Grafton Street in the city, were fined \$20 and costs or 30 days when they pleaded guilty to illegal possession of liquor. Fines of \$10 and costs or 10 days for speeding were meted out to residents of Sydney Street, Charlottetown, Vernon Bridge.

Island oyster fishermen had a fairly good week. Fishing was carried on both public and leased areas. Prices ranged from \$20 to \$22 a barrel. Fishing activity has decreased in the Bay of Fundy area in New Brunswick. Many of the weirs have been stripped lay-off, while many fishermen are using their time getting lobstering gear ready for the opening of the season on Nov. 15.

In some districts, the lobster fishing effort will be intensified during the coming season, but in other communities fishermen plan to reduce their number of traps. With one situation counter-balancing the other, the fishing effort is expected to be about the same as last year.

Three men appearing in Charlottetown Police Court Friday morning on charges of being drunk and incapable were handed heavy fines by Magistrate K.M. Martin. Fines of \$30 and costs or 40 days each were given a Clyde River man and a King Street resident. The latter's case has been remanded from Monday. Another King Street man appearing on a similar charge was fined \$20 and costs or 30 days.

Much of the fishing effort in Prince Edward Island is being concentrated on mackerel and smelt the Dept. of Fishery reports. Smelt gill net catches on both the north and south shores were good, with catches averaging from three to five pounds per net. Smelt prices ranged from 15 cents to 17 cents a pound.

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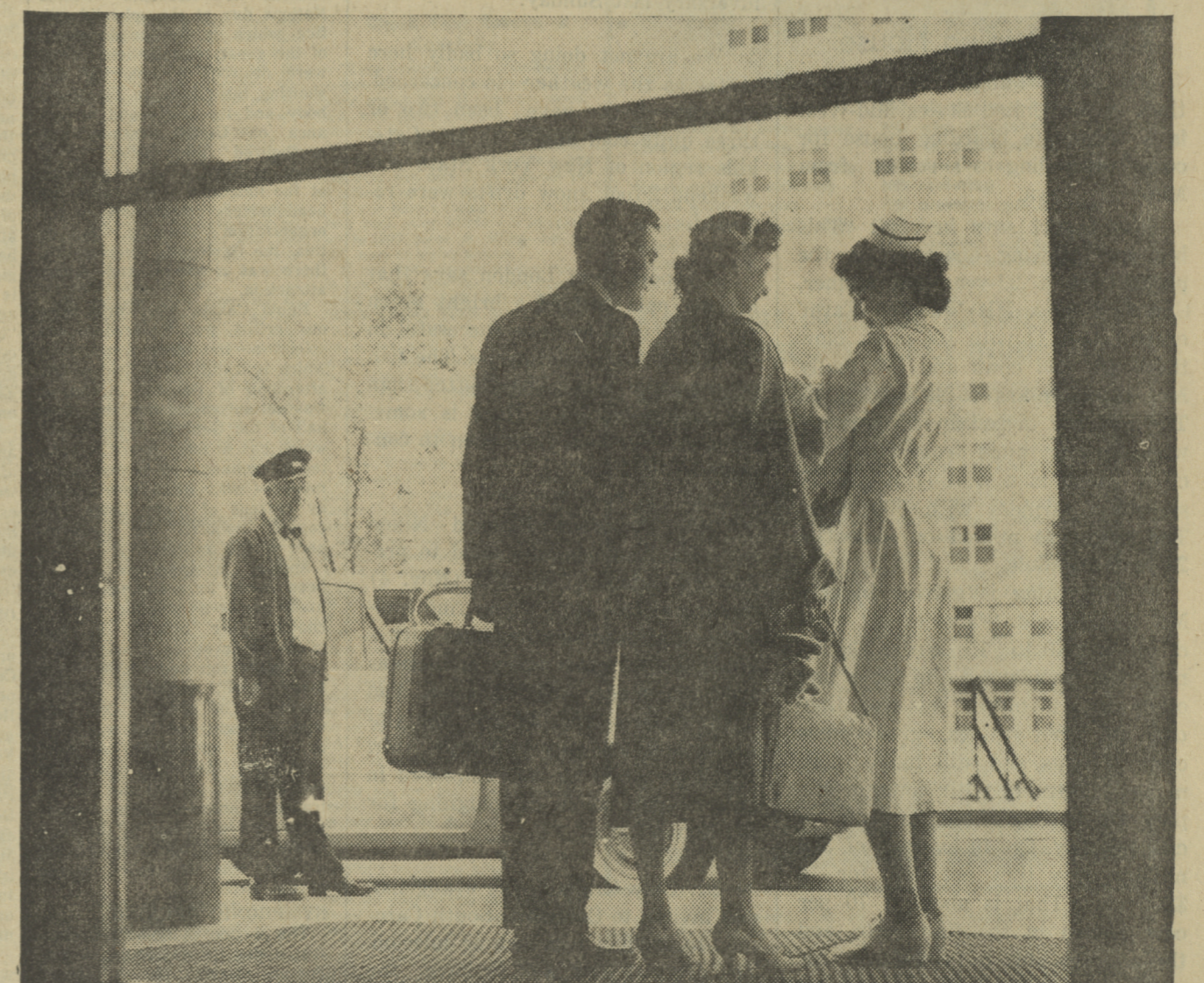
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
