

Millionaires Edge Saint John 5-4 For Beavers 2nd Defeat

SYDNEY, N.S., Nov. 5 — (CP) — Saint John Beavers suffered their second defeat in 13 Maritime Major Hockey League games here tonight when Sydney Millionaires staged a third-period comeback to rack up a 5-4 victory.

Beavers struck early in the opener when Ken Watson beat goalie Nick Pidosny in a scramble at the 30-second mark.

Millionaires appeared to approve of the week-end edict which tossed out the new icing rule. They forced Beavers for most of the 60 minutes but were held away from the Saint John net.

Millionaires evened the score three minutes after Watson's goal when Ed (White) Prokop laced a 36-foot shot from the left boards that split goalkeeper Phil Hughes' pads.

Beavers punched another at 5:37 when Al Buchanan hammered a rebound while uncovered on the left side of the crease.

The Sydney club got back on even terms on the first play of the second period when Don (Red) McRae veered in front of the net and fooled goalie Hughes with a sudden cross shot that caught the upright and stayed in.

They fought back and forth on even terms until after the half-way mark when Ed Mulligan, in a slow weave along the left boards, caught Bill McCracken all alone in front of Pidosny.

Brooklyn Dodgers' Manager Rehired

BROOKLYN, Nov. 5 — (AP) — Chuck Dressen was rehired today to manage the Brooklyn Dodgers who blew a 13½ game lead and the National League pennant in the 1951 season.

The new term will be for one year, like the first, with the official papers to be signed when Dressen comes east from his Los Angeles home. Salary is reported around \$30,000.

Walter O'Malley, Dodgers president, told a press conference Dressen will be back. It came as no surprise for the story had been bouncing around town ever since the World Series. In fact, Jackie Robinson, let the cat out of the bag Friday at Los Angeles when he said the players were told Dressen would return.

Fan indignation at seeing a World Series snatched from their grasp by Bobby Thomson's home run in the final playoff game with New York brought a stream of letters to Dodgers offices. Now that the situation has cooled off somewhat, the announcement was made.

A few minutes later word hummed over the wires from Dressen, who said "That's swell. They've always treated me fair and I appreciate they way they deal with me."

Asked why he decided to rehire Dressen O'Malley said he felt Dressen was the manager "for our purpose in 1952 and 1951."

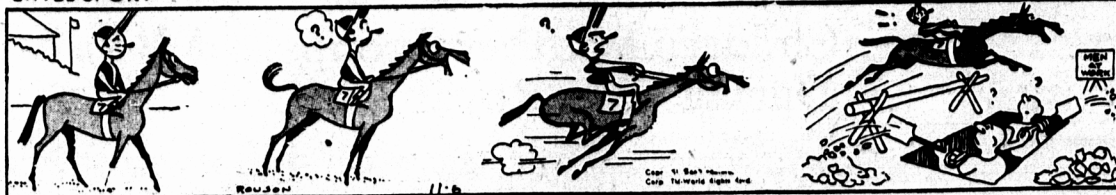

In some instances, such as the importing of two more referees into the circuit to allow all six teams to play on the same nights which will give the teams more rest between games in a gruelling 90-game schedule, will without a doubt be an improvement over the present system. As for some of the other changes, however, they still pose a big "question" mark.
