Harbor Presents Bustling Scene

GEORGETOWN — The German freighter, S.S. Diana, which arrived in Georgetown on Friday morning is expected to complete loading of 1,000 cords of cambio pulp wood and clear port for Souris where she will take on another 1,000 cords of wood.

Cambio pulp is half barked by machines and is consigned to Europe.

The cargo in Georgetown is being trucked from the Henderson Lumber Co. yard in Montserrat.

This is the Diana's second visit to Georgetown this year and on this trip on her voyage from France she lost her rudder off Newfoundland. After drifting for four days she was taken under tow to Halifax from where she sailed to Georgetown after being repaired.

Another German freighter, the S.S. Pollus, arrived off Georgetown harbour on Sunday night but will not dock until Tuesday morning when she will commence loading 15,000 cords of roused pulp wood from Henderson Lumber Co. yard in Georgetown.

She is expected to remain in Georgetown until after Christmas when she will proceed to Souris to complete loading for overseas.

Repairs Delay Treasure Hunt

OAK ISLAND, N.S. (CP) — While the sun shone on Nova Scotia's Oak Island, Sunday, more trouble poured on treasure hunter Robert Dunfield of Los Angeles.

Mr. Dunfield said the transmission of his 80-ton crane broke down Saturday night and repairs will delay operations for two days.

He said the transmission was shipped to Halifax.

Mr. Dunfield said most of the last week's work involved widening of the hole to 30 feet because "we don't want to miss anything."

Now at the 132-foot level he hopes the crane will reach the 155-foot objective within a week.

\$30 Fine Given For Obstruction

Francis William Quinn, city, charged with breaking, entry, and theft, was committed for trial before Judge and jury when he appeared in City Police Court Saturday. Magistrate A.J. Haslam, Q.C. presided.

Darrell Gallant, city, was fined \$30 and costs or 15 days for obstructing a police officer while executing his duty.

A city resident was fined \$30 and costs or 15 days for disorderly conduct.

Grover H. Campbell, Toronto, Ont., was fined \$30 and costs or 10 days for speeding. John Robert Wonnocott, city, was fined \$15 and costs on a similar charge.

Earl Watson Murdoch received a reprimand for having defective brakes.

Edison Smith, Pownal, was fined \$5 and costs or two days for left-side parking.

A city resident, charged with being drunk and disorderly, was fined \$30 and costs or 15 days plus \$7.95 or an additional three days for damages to a clothing article of a constable.

There were four cases of drunk and incapable. A city resident was committed on a previous charge while another city man was fined \$20 and costs or 20 days. A Hunter River resident was fined \$10 and costs or five days. A man from Fort Augustus was fined \$20 and costs or 10 days.

HARBOR BUSY

Georgetown harbour presents a busy scene as in addition to the freighters loading pulpwood, two dredges, Pownal No. 2 and the J.P. Porter dredge are both tied up at the Queens wharf where they will spend the winter.

The Gulf Garden Foods Ltd. trawlers, the Gulf Gallant, the Gulf Gull, Gulf Guard and the Howe Bay are docked at the railway wharf, all having landed cargoes of fish. They will remain in port until after Christmas to give their crews an opportunity to visit their homes in various Maritime centers.

The new and recently launched trawler, the Gulf Grenadier, is also docked at the railway wharf and it is expected that Hull No. 14 which is a trawler as yet unnamed will be christened and launched on Dec. 23.

Cabinet Age Shows Drop

OTTAWA (CP)—Average age of the federal cabinet dropped by 1 1/2 years under changes announced Friday by Prime Minister Pearson.

Average age of the 26 cabinet ministers now is 50.7 years. When Parliament was dissolved last Sept. 8 for the Nov. 3 federal election, the average age of the then 26-member cabinet was 52.2.

Mr. Pearson at 68 is the oldest member. Youngest is John Turner, newly-named minister without portfolio. He is 36.

Inquest Hears Men Warned Not To Make Trip In Boat

WIARTON, Ont. (CP)—Four Toronto men were warned not to make the underwater photography trip on which they drowned, a coroner's jury was told here.

The men—Peter MacFarlane, 36, executive producer of CFTO-TV, Thomas Nicholson, 26, a draftsman, and Roger Deane, 55, a University of Toronto geology professor—left Tobermory, Ont., Oct. 23 to photograph a sunken vessel off Cove Island.

Tobermory is about 48 miles northwest of here at the tip of the Bruce Peninsula. Cove Island is on the Georgian Bay side of the peninsula in Lake Huron.

Hermann Steltner, a marine engineer consultant from St. Catharines, Ont., told the hearing he warned Prof. Deane: "You will not get away with it."

Coroner J. T. H. Robinson had re-opened the adjourned inquest which began Dec. 1 after the bodies of the men, who left equipped with scuba diving gear, were discovered Oct. 27.

Mr. Steltner said the expedition was not properly planned.

"The boat was too small and not rigged for rough weather and the men were tired from their trip that morning from Toronto."

He added that the men were anxious—"anxiety is the first stage in any disaster"—and they exhibited this by putting their wet suits on before getting to the boat.

S.M. McInnis Funeral At Basilica Tuesday

Funeral services will be held tomorrow morning at 9:30 from St. Dunstan's Basilica for S. M. McInnis, Charlottetown businessman and active worker in service organizations, who died unexpectedly in Charlottetown Hospital Saturday morning.

He was the son of the late Police Sergeant Lawrence (Larry) McInnis and Mrs. McInnis.

Mr. McInnis was taken to hospital Friday. He had not enjoyed the best of health for a number of years.

A former member of the National Film Board and later employed in the visual aid department of the provincial government, Mr. McInnis subsequently opened and operated the McInnis Photo and Hobby Supply Shop on Kent Street.

During the Second World War Mr. McInnis served with the Royal Canadian Airforce, and completed a tour of 'ops' over Germany as a navigator. At the end of the war he continued his interest in the services and played a prominent role in the organization of the Confederation Wing RCAF, Charlottetown, of which he is a past president.

Keenly interested in youth, Mr. McInnis was a strong supporter of the Boy Scout movement, and for two years, 1951-53, served in the capacity of provincial commissioner.

Mr. McInnis is a former Roman Catholic and also a past president of the United Services Officers Club. He also held the post of recruiting officer for potential officer candidates from colleges here.

Mr. McInnis is survived by his wife, the former Helen Moore of Charlottetown, and four children. They are, Kathy, 16, Brian, 13, Linda, 7 and Elizabeth, 6. A brother Lorne resides in Montreal.
