FOX BREEDERS SCORE — Fox breeders from Prince Edward Island captured nearly all the championships and first placings at the fox show at the Maritime Winter Fair concluded here today. The platinum, standard pearl platinum, white mark pearl platinum and glacier blues were judged today by Douglas Bell of Carleton.

When the show concluded this evening George Calbeck of Summerside had nearly enough ribbons to cover the walls of a good sized room.

In the two days Calbeck won two grand champions, five championships, and four reserve championships. Today his placings included an even dozen firsts, eight seconds, four thirds, four fourths and a fifth. Calbeck also made an outstanding showing in the horse classes. This afternoon he took four firsts, a second, third, fourth and the reserve championship in the stallions.

F. G. Cameron of Summerside had a good day at the fox show. He showed the champion female in the pearl platinum, the champion glacier female, a grand reserve champion, and two reserve champions.

He also won eight firsts, five seconds, three thirds, three fourths, a fifth and a sixth.

Ernest T. Mill and son Clayton of Kennington made another very strong showing. They showed the grand champion white mark pearl platinum as well as the champion male and female in the class.

They also showed the grand champion, reserve champion platinum and glacier foxes.

In placings they picked up four firsts, six seconds, seven thirds, four fourths, three fifths and three sixths.

Appeal Cases In Supreme Court

The regular November sitting of the Supreme Court opened in Georgetown Courthouse yesterday with Mr. Justice Mark R. McGuinty presiding. There were two appeal cases on the docket.

In the first case The Queen versus Charles A. Gardiner, appellant, was an appeal from a decision of Magistrate J. W. McDonald on a conviction of driving while ability was impaired. At the request of counsel the case was adjourned for argument to Chambers in Charlottetown on a date to be fixed. Messrs. J. O. C. Campbell, Q.C., and S.S. Hessian, Q.C., represented the Crown, while Mr. M. A. Farmer appeared for the appellant.

In the second case heard, The Queen, respondent, versus William Marshall Condon, Souris, the conviction of King's County Magistrate J. W. McDonald on a Temperance Act charge, was quashed and the appeal was fixed with costs of \$40. Mr. M. J. McQuaid represented the Crown with Mr. L. J. O'Donnell appearing for the appellant.

During the court session Mr. J. O. C. Campbell made a motion that Mr. W. Keith Matheson, Souris druggist, be appointed a commissioner for the taking of affidavits for King's County. The Supreme Court then adjourned sine die.
