Giants Prove They're Not One-Man Ball Club

NEW YORK, May 12 — (AP) — The folks who buried New York Giants when Monte Irvin broke his ankle are sneaking down back alleys. They wear the guilty look of a man caught lifting a newspaper out of a trash basket.

By circling the Western bases and Boston at a sprightly 10-out-of-11 clip, the Giants proved they were no one-man ball club. Maybe the imminent loss to the army of Willie Mays will prove they are a two-man club.

Now it looks more like a Sal Maglie-Larry Jansen-Jim Hearn club. The unbeaten "Big Three" of the pitching staff is 10-0 for the year. Wes Westrum (.333) and Whitey Lockman (.310) are the only 300 hitters on the club.

The Giants are the hottest thing in the majors. No question about that. But Cleveland and Washington also are running a temperature.

Three straight wins at Yankee Stadium led the Indians trading on the clouds. Sunday's double win over the deflated St. Louis Browns left them two full games in front of the league.

Washington, too, has been walking on air. Since Bucky Harris acquired Jackie Hensens, Archie Wilson and Spec Shea from the Yanks, he has won seven of eight. The Senators are in second place as they hit the road to Detroit for their first western swing.

For the next 10 days the Eastern teams of the American League will be in the west, opening with an interesting three-game series between New York and Cleveland.

The Browns learned some of the facts of life in the east, dropping from the super level to the .500 class. Still they are tied with the Yanks for fourth place and about to open a long home stand. First opposition comes from the Philadelphia A's, who have picked up considerably after a horrible start.

Boston's youthful Red Sox, knocked out of first place by losing three to the Yanks, open their jaunt at Chicago. All four American League games tomorrow will be played at night.

The Giants, who have played only four home games, face Cincinnati at the Polo Grounds tomorrow night.

Cincinnati and the Chicago Cubs, tied for third place, continue to surprise with their consistent play. They have dropped off a bit from their early splurge but remain well over the .500 mark.

Tigers Plan To Strengthen Team; Rolfe To Stay

DETROIT, May 12 — (AP) — Red Rolfe will stick around as manager of Detroit Tigers, who are uncomfortably berthed in last place in the American League.

But the Tigers will try to gain strength or new faces in the trade mart—even if it means dealing out such stars as third baseman George Kell or outfielders Hoot Evers, Johnny Groth and Vic Werz.

That came straight from general Charlie Gehringer today after he huddled with president Spike Briggs.

"I'm satisfied with the way Red is running the team," Gehringer said.

Gehringer indicated that the club might trade at any cost to get some fresh faces.

The club now has suffered through an eight-game and a seven-game losing streak. The Tigers, idle today, are 10 1-2 games out of first place.

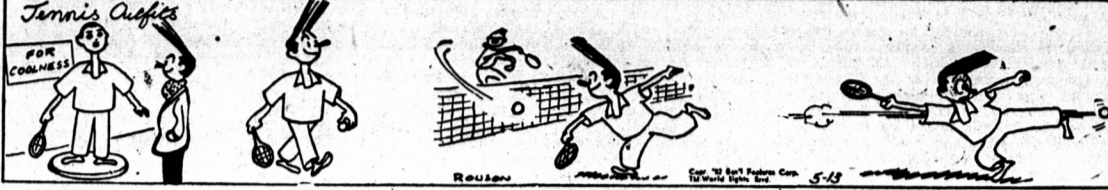

Mount Allison Wins Intercollegiate Meet

SACKVILLE, N.B., May 12 — (CP) — Mount Allison University, led by three athletes from St. Kitts B.W.I., today won the Maritime intercollegiate track and field championship.

Competing on their own field, the collegians tallied 65 points, 20 more than second-place Acadia University, Wolfville, N.S.

University of New Brunswick, Fredericton, had 36 points and St. Mary's University, Halifax, 16.

Strong winds and drizzle hampered activities. No records were broken.

The West Indies' trio was outstanding. Keith Blake, jumping in his bare feet, took the high jump at five feet, four inches. Rudy Murray travelled 36 feet, 1-2 inches in the hop, step and jump, and Cliff Taylor won the 120-yard hurdles in 15.6 seconds, 1-5 second off the Maritime intercollegiate record.

Clint Russel, Acadia, won the 440-yard dash in 54.6 seconds, and teammate Jack Clark, who earlier won the discus event with a 103-foot, 10-inch throw, captured the shot put with a throw of 41 feet, one inch.

Acadia's A. Breault won the Javelin event with a mighty hurl of 131 feet, one inch.

For St. Mary's, John Martin and Warner captured the laurels. Martin easily won the mile race in four minutes, 45.6 seconds and took the 880 in two minutes, 5 seconds. Warner won the 100-yard dash in 10.6 seconds.

W. Elliott, Mount A., won the hammer throw, 87 feet, 2-1/2 inches.

U.N.B. won the pole vaulting event when Ron Clark sailed over the bar at nine feet, 4 inches.

Mount Allison won the 800-yard relay and Acadia took the mile.
