### 5 Accidents Reported, Two Persons Injured

Five accidents were reported to the RCMP on roads in Queens County over the weekend and at least two persons were hospitalized with injuries.

At approximately 8 o'clock Saturday a car driven by Louis Shaw of Charlottetown went out of control on a curve between New Glasgow and Cavendish and went into the ditch. Two passengers, Carol Taylor and Susan MacEwen both of Parkdale were taken to the P.E.I. Hospital suffering from cuts and bruises. Miss Taylor also suffered a broken ankle.

Two cars were involved in an accident near the Hillsboro Bridge in Charlottetown at 11:30 Saturday night. The drivers of the vehicles were Richard Whitman Cook and Robert G. MacMillan.

Two other mishaps occurred moments apart at the same location at 3:30 a.m. Sunday when a one-ton truck driven by Angus Leslie MacLean, Montserrat, and a car driven by Eugene Francis Bradley, Mt. Edward Road in Sherwood collided at an intersection near the Southport Esplanade service station. Before police could arrive there a car driven by Albert Preston Fogarty, Cardigan was in collision with the Bradley car. It was not immediately known if any injuries occurred.

A two-car crash was reported to have occurred at the intersection of North River Road and the Trans-Canada Highway involving vehicles driven by Walter Garburn Parkdale, and Rodney Walsh, Charlottetown. It was believed that a woman passenger in one of the cars was injured. However, this could not be confirmed.

### Transport Bd. Hearings Open Today

Open to the public the first of six hearings by the Board of Transport Commissioners of applications for changes in schedules by Canadian National Railways, will get underway at 10 a.m. today at Carleton.

Other hearings today are scheduled for Fredericton at 1:30 p.m. and at Clyde at 4 p.m. In all hearings today's decisions take place. The CNR proposes to discontinue the services of station caretakers.

Tuesday, the commission sits in Ellerslie at 10 a.m. and in Coleman at 1:30 p.m. The CNR plans to discontinue use of their agent and at Coleman the caretaker services at the station will be stopped.

The commission sits at Vernon River on Wednesday at 10 a.m. where the CNR plans to close its station from May to October.

### Dog Owners Draw Fines

As a result of the continued drive by the city police against dogs running at large, four dog owners appeared before Magistrate A.J. Haslam in city police court Saturday, and each was fined \$5 and costs or two days in jail.

Police Chief Strem Webster said the problem of dogs' tearing up flower gardens, chasing cars and bicycles, barking frequently, and so forth, is one that has been with us for centuries. "We've been getting a lot of complaints lately," he said. "Right now we're trying to do something about it."

For infractions of the traffic by-laws, two motorists were each fined \$10 and costs or 5 days. One was convicted of failing to stop at a red traffic light, the other of disobeying a yield right of way sign.

There were six cases of drunk and incapable. Two were sentenced to 30 days in Queens County Jail, two were fined \$20 and costs or 15 days, one was fined \$10 and costs or 5 days, and a first offender was given a 30-day suspended sentence.

### APEC Review Gives Pulse For District

HALIFAX — Release has been announced of the third edition of APEC's Statistical Review, a guide to business interested in investing in the Atlantic Provinces, and a valuable aid to students, teachers, government officials and business in general.

The 1963 Statistical Review of the economic pulse of the Atlantic Provinces, is a new, more complete form, says Gerald E. Martin, APEC Director. The publication is available without charge, from the APEC office, 1591 South Park Street, Halifax.

Embracing all phases of the diversified economy in the area of the Atlantic Provinces," Mr. Martin concluded.

The publication is available in French and English. It contains 73 tables, which present a complete picture of past and present economic conditions and trends in the Atlantic region. The tables are grouped under such headings as investment, finance, trade, population, production, income, taxes, manufacturing, transportation and communication.

The review was compiled from government and other information by the staff of the APEC research office in Fredericton. At a glance is found such pertinent information as population, value of fish landings, value of forest production, value added by manufacturers, construction contract awards, retail trade statistics, net value of commodity producing industries, personal and farm cash income from farming operations.

The publication is viewed as a guide to business interested in investing in the Atlantic Provinces, and a valuable aid to students, teachers, government officials and business in general.

### Eastern Orthodox Families Here Visited By Archbishop

Several firms were recorded over the weekend for some 60 Island families of the Eastern Orthodox faith.

For the first time an Orthodox Archbishop, Metropolitan Michael Shaheen of Toledo, Ohio, visited P.E.I., and for the first time Pontifical Eastern Orthodox services were held on the Island.

Archbishop Shaheen explained that there were approximately 60 families in this area who were formerly of the Orthodox faith but since there was no such church on the Island they had taken in largely by the Anglicans and this visit by him was to bring their own religion back to them.

Special messages were brought to the Charlottetown community from the mother church in St. Nicholas, Syria, Archbishop Shaheen said. He also extended special thanks to the Anglican Church for locking after his people in the absence of their own place of worship.

Archbishop Shaheen, the only American-born bishop of the Orthodox Church, arrived in Charlottetown Saturday and had the special guest of Atallah J. Ghis and E.N. Kays. He leaves today for other points in Canada and the U.S.
