ALL 10 OBJECTED TO Labor Relations Board Hears 10 Applications

The P.E.I. Labor Relations Board convened last night in the Law Courts Building to hear 10 applications for certification by four unions. Chairman of the board is Charles R. McQuaid, Charlottetown. Board members are Jack Brown, Charlottetown, Reginald MacLellan, Summerside, Frederick DeCoste, Charlottetown and George Meikle, Summerside.

All 10 of the union applications were objected to by various employers. Six of the union applicants were represented by their attorney, D. Frank Sigsworth. The other three applicants were not represented by legal counsel. Alan K. Scapes acted for all of the employers filing objections.

The cases set down for hearing last night were as follows: Three applications by Local 72 C International Union of Operating Engineers, opposed by Douglas Brothers and Jones Inc.; Douglas Brothers and Jones Inc.; Bevan Brothers Ltd., R.T. Morrison Ltd. and Inman Plumbing and Heating Ltd., respectively; Local 1181, United Packing House, Food, and Allied Workers, application opposed by Langley Fruit Packers Ltd.; and two applications by Local 2 (P.E.I.) Construction and General Labor Union, opposed by Bagnall's Mills Ltd., and Louis Howatt Jr.

ONLY CASE HEARD

The only case heard last evening was the application of local 1181 United Packing House, Food and Allied Workers, objected to by Langley Fruit Packers Ltd. The objections were lodged and argued by Alan K. Scapes and the union case was argued by their attorney, D. Frank Sigsworth.

At the direction of the chairman, the board adjourned to consider the arguments of counsel without fixing a date at which time a written report of their decision will be provided. The chairman, Mr. McQuaid, assured counsel, however, that the decision of the Board would be reported to the parties involved as soon as possible.

was given by Cameron MacDonald, principal of the Prince County Vocational School in Summerside, who suggested that although the graduates have knowledge they may lack wisdom and education which they must yet acquire and develop, so that at the end of twenty years they will be able to say they have had twenty years' experience, not one year's experience twenty times.

"To progress from books to education, from knowledge to wisdom, you must have a want, a desire, something driving you to develop and learn and accomplish," he told them.

"This desire must be nurtured so that you consciously put forth every effort to move ahead, to succeed, to accomplish your immediate goal... with the will to do this there is determination and success."

"In the way of education you have three choices," he continued. "Quit now and go to work. This is not wrong, but is it right? Ask the men who have stopped," he suggested.

VOCATIONAL TRAINING

The other alternatives he named are to take vocational training (for which there is great need) or to go to university to acquire more knowledge and training for a specific profession.

Making reference to the tremendous changes which have taken place on the earth within the last generation or two, he asked: "If there were such great wonders in our generation, then how much more in yours? It seems that today no wonder imagining is beyond man's power to achieve. But this great and wonderful world will demand so much of the people making it tick that the uneducated man or woman who cannot take advantage of the chance will be lost."

Mr. MacDonald stated that he does not believe the world is a mess. "There may be the odd fracture," he said, "but nothing to kill the patient. There are ways the basic problems of food, clothing and shelter," he continued, and then went on to remind the class that "man is in the world over; in some places he may not have enough to eat, but he is the same kind of man. It is only the outgoing of yourself that will bring this person alive to you. There are wars and rumours of wars... there always will be... but with the courage that comes from knowledge and wisdom you can face the future unafraid."

His closing words were the advice given by Polonius to his son: "To thine own self be true, and it must follow, as the night the day, thou canst not then be false to any man."
