OTTAWA, April 17 — (Special) — Fisheries Minister Mayhew said in the Commons this afternoon that his department is considering a resolution from the Prince Edward Island Fisheries Federation seeking that the opening of the lobster season be advanced from May 1 this year to April 29. The statement was in reply to a question asked by W. Chester S. McLure, Progressive Conservative member for Queen's.

Mr. Mayhew expected to give a definite answer to the question tomorrow or on Wednesday.

During the question period in the House of Commons, Mr. M. Lure asked Resources and Development Minister Winters if he had received a petition from the residents of Crapaud and vicinity asking for consideration in the location of the Prince Edward Island section of the Trans-Canada highway. Mr. Winters' reply was in the negative.

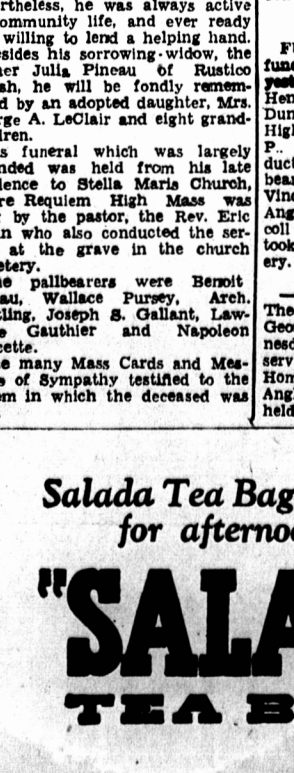

Three Island sisters and a friend from Cambridge, Massachusetts, will be among those making a Holy Year visit to Rome this summer, it was learned last night.

The sisters are Misses Ann Walsh, a teacher in Queen Square School; Mildred Walsh, an employee of Koffe's Hygienic and real estate; and Mildred Walsh, who teaches in Wellington School, Cambridge, Miss Charlotte Cairns, who also teaches in Cambridge, will accompany them.

Summer training trips listed for this year include ships for Alaska, China, Mexico, South America, West Indies, Greenland and Baffinland.

Capt. Quinn has been in the Navy since he was fifteen, and was in command of the frigate Strathmore on March 11th, 1944, when it sighted and sank a submarine in the Irish Sea.
