Firestone Reduces Tire Prices

Sweeping across-the-board price reductions on its tires and tubes was announced today by the Firestone Tire and Rubber Company of Canada Limited. Prices on passenger tires, small sized truck tires, tubes and farm tires have been cut 12 1/2 percent, while large sized truck tires have been cut 15 percent. According to R. I. Raycroft, Firestone general sales manager, the tax reduction announced earlier this week accounts for only part of the price cut. Dropping prices of crude rubber are also credited for lower costs. As Mr. Raycroft points out the tax reduction actually amounts to only six percent on the suggested price list since excise taxes are computed on the net dealer price. "Firestone's price cuts are far in excess of the tax saving," he states. "Car owners can now buy our popular Champion 600/16 tire as low as \$19.95 while the Champion super-balloon 670/15 now sells for \$24.95. Continued from page 1 recalled to duty have been largely accomplished. Eisenhower wrote Defense Secretary Robert Lovett in a letter formally requesting his release. "The command has been formed. Its procedures established, and basic questions settled." Eisenhower also made it clear that he is coming home to take an active role in the political campaign which his supporters have been compelled to wage by proxy in recent weeks while he remained silent.

Promises Fight

Meanwhile, Eisenhower promised in a letter made public today in Morristown, N.J., that if he is nominated he will conduct a fighting campaign to unseat the Democratic administration. "If by any chance it should come about that the Republican Party does name me as its standard bearer, I am determined to lead the entire organization into a fight in which there will be no cessation, no rest, and no lack of intensity until the final decision is made," he said. Although technically on the inactive list, Eisenhower will still be a five-star general of the army and subject to recall to military duty in case of national need. Presidential Secretary Joseph Short told reporters he had no news as to Eisenhower's successor.

Six Children Included

Six children were among the 64 passengers, most of them Puerto Ricans on their way to New York for Easter. The airliner crashed at 11:02 A.M. E.S.T. five miles northwest of the San Juan harbor entrance. It was due to arrive at Idlewild Airport in New York at 4:47 P.M. Shortly after the four-engine DC-4 took off from San Juan Airport, the pilot reported he was in difficulty and was returning to the base.

Romance From Crash

Burn's romance and marriage to Miss Froman grew out of a plane crash off Lisbon, Portugal, in 1943. Miss Froman was en route with a troupe to entertain soldiers. Burn, the co-pilot of the plane, held her afloat after the crash until rescue came. The singer was confined to a wheel chair for three years as a result of injuries suffered in the crash. Burn himself suffered a broken back in that crash. Miss Froman married Burn in 1948.

Today's crash recalled another one on June 7, 1949, when 53 Puerto Ricans were killed in a similar plunge into the sea off the coast of this U.S. island territory. The world's worst plane disaster occurred March 12, 1950, at Cardiff, Wales, taking the lives of 80 soccer fans returning from a game in Dublin. The passenger list carried the name of seven persons from the U.S. mainland: Leo Van Duglen, his wife, Mrs. Eunice Van Duglen, his son, Mark, all of St. Paul, Minn.; Jackie, Mrs. Dalia and Juan Jenevsky, of Dayton, Ohio; and Mrs. Novella Hudson, of Hastings-on-Hudson, N.Y. One co-pilot said the loss of one of the plane's engines had caused the craft to crash. The Coast Guard brought survivors, including nine adults and one infant, to San Juan.
