

Bulganin Sends Friendly Letter To British P.M.

LONDON (Reuters) — Soviet Premier Bulganin has sent a long, "very friendly" letter to Prime Minister Macmillan, a reliable source said Tuesday.

The letter, calling for an improvement in Anglo-Soviet relations, was delivered by Ambassador Jacob Malik two days ago. Diplomatic observers said the letter is an additional sign that Russia is planning a new "peace offensive" aimed at restoring the Geneva spirit of the 1955 summit conference.

In a new paper, Tuesday published Bulganin's personal letters to the British and French premiers last September urging a peaceful solution of the Suez dispute. Replies from Sir Anthony Eden and Guy Mollet also were published.

Britain beat Russia to the draw Monday night by publishing the Eden-Bulganin exchange only a few hours before the letters appeared in Izvestia. Macmillan shattered diplomatic precedent by ordering the publication.

Moscow had announced late Monday that the letters would appear in Izvestia Tuesday morning.

FRANCE NOT EXCITED
France remained aloof from the race for publication. A French foreign ministry spokesman said in Paris Tuesday: "We are not at all excited about the Soviet move, which is strictly for propaganda purposes."

He added: "It is certainly a lack of courtesy on the part of the Soviet government toward our-

selves and toward the British government."

Only 48 hours earlier, Russia sent notes to the Western powers renewing the Soviet call earlier this year for a big-power declaration to keep Middle East peace.

Moscow's diplomatic moves were made as drawn-out negotiations between Egypt and the United States on future Suez Canal operations neared a decision.

Bulganin's letters to Eden and Mollet defended Egypt's sovereignty over the canal and restated Soviet opposition to foreign operation of the waterway.

BROADCAST TO ARABS
Significantly, Moscow Radio Tuesday broadcast to the Arab nations a 20-minute summary of the letters. The broadcast was made at dictation speed.

Bulganin predicted Sept. 11—seven weeks before the Anglo-French intervention—that such action would cut off oil to Europe and arouse the "profound hatred" of the Afro-Asian nations against Britain and France. He added that a military attack on Egypt "can only end in failure."

Bulganin said that "minor wars can grow into large ones with all the grave consequences resulting from this." He denied that Russia was inciting Egypt and appealed for a peaceful settlement of the Suez dispute "with due regard to the interests of all the states concerned."

EVEN SAW MISCONCEPTION
Eden, who resigned as prime minister last January, replied

Sept. 16 that Bulganin's letter "seems to be based on a complete misconception of the position."

The Soviet premier's letter to Mollet, similar to the one sent to Eden, said: "We suppose that for France, the terrible bloody lesson of events in Viet Nam must be specially memorable... it seems to us that the experience of Viet Nam is sufficiently instructive."

(The eight-year French war against Communists in Indochina ended in 1954 with the division of Viet Nam into a Communist north and Democratic south.)

Mollet replied Oct. 10 that Soviet Middle East policy was leading "not to an easing but to a sharpening of antagonism."

Bulganin replied to Eden's letter Sept. 28 and to a second Eden letter Oct. 23.

RUSSIAN ROCKET THREAT
The final letter in the exchanges came Nov. 5—the day before a Suez cease-fire—when Bulganin threatened rocket attacks on Britain and France. Until Monday night, this was the only letter that had been made public.

Bulganin's new letter to Macmillan followed an exchange of letters in January and February when the British prime minister declined an invitation to visit Moscow in May.

A reliable source said the new letter ran 8,000 words and covered the whole field of relations between the two countries.

It was said to expand upon a talk Bulganin held with British Ambassador Sir Patrick Reilly in Moscow April 12.

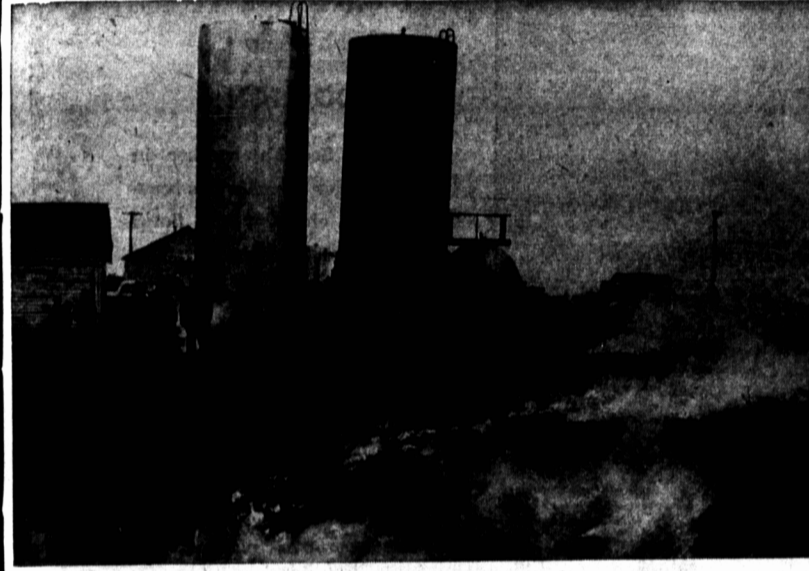

New Officers Of Summerville Rotary Club Are Announced

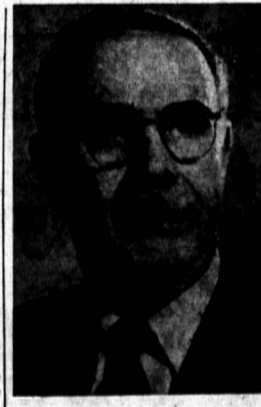

Credit Union Movement Is Subject Of Talk At S'ide

Rev. Dr. Dan MacCormack of St. Francis Xavier University Antigonish, was guest speaker last evening at a most enthusiastic credit union rally held in the Epworth Hall.

Dr. MacCormack came to Summerville on the invitation of the officers of the three local unions, the St. Paul's Union, Trinity Union and the Community Credit Union.

Mr. J.K. Duggan of Trinity credit union presided at the meeting which was well attended by members of the three unions and by others who indicated that they were interested in the movement.

In his most interesting address Dr. MacCormack stressed the fact that the credit union movement was not a fly by night movement destined to fade out as time goes by. He said it was now one hundred years old and that the basic reason for its origin and its continued growth was that it was a movement for the good of the common people, the little man, those who needed financial assistance at a reasonable rate of interest and that it was an expression of the democratic way of life in that it gave the common man a say in how it should be conducted.

He stated that there are approximately four thousand credit unions in Canada today with one million, seven hundred and fifty thousand members, with a membership that has saved for themselves
