#### May Eliminate Opposition To Price Fixing Bill

OTTAWA, Nov. 29 — (CP) — A move was initiated today to block the possibility of widespread price wars in the event that Parliament bans resale price - maintenance practices. David Croll (L. — Toronto Spadina), placed before Parliament's retail price-fixing committee notice of a motion to make cut-throat price-cutting and loss-leader selling illegal. The move came at the end of a stormy session in which charges of "gagging" and using "delaying tactics" were made. It likely will eliminate a big segment of opposition to the government's proposal to make price maintenance illegal and enable the committee to finish work in time to place legislation before Parliament at the current session, expected to end about Dec. 19. Mr. Croll's notice of motion goes to the advisory group of the main committee for consideration. Under Mr. Croll's proposal no dealer will be allowed to sell "directly or indirectly" any commodity — with certain exceptions — at a price less than five per cent above cost. ### Transport Board Salary Increases Protested By Queen's County Member

OTTAWA, Nov. 29 — (Special) — When discussion of the freight rates equalization bill continued in the Commons today, W. Chester S. McLure, Conservative member for Queen's, reiterated his charges that work of the Board of Transport Commissioners had been neither effective nor satisfactory in Prince Edward Island. He expressed the hope that with the substantial salary increases provided for members of the Board the Government would be able to obtain the services of experienced and capable personnel. Mr. McLure attempted to probe into the duties of the Transport Board. Transport Minister Chevrier skillfully side-stepped the question by saying the duties are set forth in sections 32 and 33 of the Railways Act. "So far as the railway problems in our Province are concerned," the Queen's member charged, "I believe this board has always acted as a buffer between the Minister of Transport and the people who are looking for railway service. Whether or not we are getting the right class of man on this board, I do not know." Mr. McLure contends that choice of members of the Transport Board are not and have not been happy ones. Some appointed to the post of Chief Commissioner or Commissioner have been lawyers and interested chiefly if not solely in railway law. Then (Continued on Page 8 Col. 5)

### Syrian Strong Man Ousts Pro-Russian Premier

DAMASCUS, Syria, Nov. 29 — (AP) — Syria's new pro-Russian premier and his ministers were ousted today in a swift, bloodless military coup by Lt.-Col. Adib Shisheki, a power behind the scenes since 1949. Old rivalries were apparent between the dominant Populist Party and the army Shisheki directs as chief-of-staff. The Syrian strong man never gave Populist Marout Dawalibi, advocate of closer Arabic-Russian ties, a chance to get set as successor to pro-Western Premier Hassan El Hakeem, a backer of the projected Middle East defence command who resigned Nov. 10. Less than 24 hours after Dawalibi succeeded in forming a coalition cabinet with the backing of his Populists, Independents and the Moslem Brotherhood, the soldiers struck. ### Lively Debate At Meeting Of Queen's Co. Federation

Agreement with the proposal to change the present set-up of the Federation of Agriculture was reached yesterday at the County Annual Meeting held in the Leggin Hall. Approximately 100 members of the Queen's County Federation were present with Mrs. Allison MacMillan, Fairview, vice president presiding in the absence of president Mr. Earl Ings. The long debates on practically every point brought up for discussion delayed adjournment until nearly midnight. Some of the most acrimonious discussions centred around the proposed changes in the Federation and on the proposed electoral reform. In the latter case it was finally decided by resolution that the Legislature be urged to revise the Election Act at the coming session and that the Government be asked to appoint a non-partisan committee presided over by a justice of the Supreme Court to review the Act and advise on changes. A large number of members spoke on the resolution with a large section feeling that the Federation should go on record outright as asking for the abolishing of the property vote. Motions were made and withdrawn as bitterness became evident over a system which permits a property owner to vote for both a councillor and an assemblyman whereas the franchise vote only allows voting for an assemblyman. Federation Re-organization The plan for re-organization of the Federation calls for the omission of the present county organizations and a new alignment of the counties into various Federation Districts. In Queen's County there would be 10 such districts with their centres being tentative (Continued on Page 5 Col. 4)

### St. Andrew's Day Honoured By The Caledonian Club

The life and accomplishments of one of the greatest Scotsmen of all time, Alexander Graham Bell, and his personal acquaintance were extolled by His Honour, Lieutenant-Governor J. A. D. McCurdy of Nova Scotia at the 12th annual St. Andrew's Day celebration held last night at The Charlottetown. There was a large attendance at the banquet under the auspices of the Caledonian Club of Prince Edward Island with President Walter R. Shaw presiding. Seated at the head table were His Worship, Mayor J. D. Stewart, Hon. W. J. P. MacMillan, Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell, the Hon. Mr. McCurdy, President W. R. Shaw, Chief Wendell Beaton, Squadron Leader W. D. Foster, aide-de-camp to the Lieutenant-Governor of Nova Scotia, Premier J. Walter Jones, and Clansman Malcolm MacKinnon. "We are here to pay tribute to that great Scottish Patriot, St. Andrew, and to extol the virtues, of which there are many," the Hon. Mr. McCurdy said, "of the Scots themselves, not only those who remained in the land of their birth, but also to remember with much pride some of those who for one reason or another made their home in other parts of the world."

### T.C.A. Wins Case With Mink Rancher

HALIFAX, Nov. 29 — (CP) — A legal action which caught the attention of many airlines will end in favor of Trans-Canada Air Lines and against a mink farmer, it was learned today. Nova Mink Limited of nearby Musquodoboit Harbor will sell its assets Dec. 11 to satisfy a claim for costs by the airline. The mink company sued T.C.A. for \$10,000 about a year ago, claiming that an airline aircraft passed over the farm, frightening the mother mink and causing them to swallow their "kits". A Supreme Court jury found in favor of the mink company but the Full Bench of the Supreme Court revised the decision and ordered the company to pay damages of \$1,016. The case has wide significance for airlines. Mr. Justice Vincent C. MacDonald, who wrote the main appeal decision, found T.C.A. did not owe a special duty of care to the mink company and that the pilot of the aircraft would be in no position to know his flight held special danger to the young mink.

### Oil Heir Marries Egyptian Dancer

CAIRO, Nov. 29 — (AP) — Texas oil heir Sheppard (Abdullah) King was married today to Egyptian dancer Samia Gamal in a Moslem religious ceremony. King, who became a Moslem and assumed the name of Abdullah so he could marry the Nile beauty, repeated in Arabic — with a Texas drawl — an expression of faith in Allah and a promise to give Samia \$80,000. Red-haired King and his dark-haired bride will live in her apartment in swanky suburban Zamalek until they leave for the United States later in December. King says everything is straightened out with his mother, who bitterly opposed his romance with the shapely dancer, and he hopes to take her to Houston soon. Samia says she has contracts to dance in Miami and New York.

### Tito To Release Catholic Archbishop

BELGRADE, Nov. 29 — (Reuters) — Archbishop Alojz Stepinac will be released from prison before the end of next month and will be allowed to remain in Yugoslavia, it was authoritatively learned here tonight. The Archbishop, head of the Roman Catholic Church in Yugoslavia, was jailed by the Communist Government in October, 1946, on charges of "offences against the people." His sentence was for 16 years. Marshal Tito offered to release the Archbishop last summer if the Vatican would agree to his leaving Yugoslavia. Tito has apparently changed his mind now and is willing to allow the Archbishop to remain in the country.

### Amazing Number Of Trucks Seen Behind Lines

U.S. FIFTH FORCE HEAD-QUARTERS KOREA, Nov. 30 — (Friday) — (AP) — The Fifth Air Force today reported sighting the astonishing total of 7,765 Communist trucks last night in North Korea. This is about double the previous record. The conclusion was inescapable — the Reds were swinging into a big buildup as action died to a whisper along the fighting front. The Allied armies, almost surfeited with targets, attacked more than 3,500 of the trucks and damaged 300 were destroyed. ### No Extra Food Available For U.K. From Canada

LONDON, Nov. 29 — (CP) — Canada's Agricultural Minister J. G. Gardiner indicated today that Britain can look for little extra food from Canada in the immediate future. Before boarding a homeward-bound plane he said: "The only way there can be more food produced in Canada is for some plan to be laid down to produce it." His statement implied that no such plan is forthcoming. He said there is no hope of Canada sending Britain any beef or bacon, nor of increasing present cheese exports. "At the moment, Canada is selling all her surplus beef to the United States," Gardiner said.

### Basis Of Truck Registration Changed By Order-In-Council

While fees for registration of passenger cars remain unchanged, the whole basis of truck registration in Prince Edward Island has been altered under provisions of the Highway Traffic Act, 1950. The new regulations, now published in the Royal Gazette, become effective on Jan. 1, 1952. Since 1950 truck registration fees have depended upon unladen weight, and on whether the body was stake or hoist type, with permissible load dependent on the wheel-base. It then cost no more to register for the maximum permissible load. This has been changed to a gross weight basis, still with a limit for each type of truck but permitting owners to register for less than the permissible load and pay a correspondingly lower fee. (As an example of type limit, the gross weight allowed with a 156-inch wheel-base is 17,200 pounds.) ### South Korean Army Arsenal Explodes

PUSAN, Korea, Nov. 30 — (Friday) — (AP) — The South Korean Government arsenal exploded today in a mighty blast that shook this provisional capital before dawn, and caused a considerable number of casualties. South Korean national police and U. S. military police had no immediate estimate of the number killed and injured, but it was feared it would be large. Korean, American and British police directed rescue work. Authorities had no early clue whether the blast was accidental or caused by sabotage. Following the first detonation at 4 a. m. (2 p. m. Thursday, EST) ammunition was thrown high into the air and exploded like a giant fireworks display. Flames rose high over the area, spreading a red glare that lit up the night. The arsenal was greatly expanded in the last 18 months. Hand grenades were manufactured there. In addition a large variety of arms and explosives were stored in the area.
