

Lobster Carnival Speaker Seeks Agricultural Interest

SUMMERSIDE — Joe Clark of Summerside Lobster Carnival committee was the guest speaker at the regular monthly meeting of the East Prince Junior Farmers' Association held in the department of agriculture offices Summerside Thursday night.

Mr. Clark showed slides of the Lunenburg Fisheries Exhibition which featured many picturesque floats. Most of the decorations on these floats were made of foil, crepe paper or dyed cotton which helps cut down on expenses.

"We hope this year to have a calf roping contest, a calf class competition, a greased pig contest and other features relative to agriculture" stated Mr. Clark.

In order for this program to be successful we will need the assistance of agricultural organizations.

The president John Dekker presided and introduced the guest speaker who stayed for the entire meeting.

Urban Laughlin distributed booklets on farm management which he received from David Ward, economist with the provincial department in Charlottetown.

The business portion of the meeting was relative to this Lobster Carnival.

"It is through the Women's Institutes, Junior Farmers, etc., that the Carnival can grow according to the way you develop it" concluded Mr. Clark.

A committee consisting of Glenford MacLean, John Dekker and John Hutchinson was appointed to work with carnival officials at a later date.

West Prince Hit By Power Failure

Parts of Western Prince County were blacked out for a time last night by a power failure which originated west of the Summerside RCAF station.

Part of Alberton, O'Leary and Tignish were blacked out as a result. The resulting power loss also affected telephone central offices for a time.

Communication difficulties made it impossible to get a definite reason for the failure although there was some indication that it was located in the Wellington area.

One report said that long distance telephone service was temporarily disrupted but a Charlottetown long distance operator said late last night that calls had been going through to the Western part of the province through the night.

Train Is Derailed Before Reaching Open Bridge

COS COB, Conn. (AP)—About 30 passengers aboard a New Haven railroad passenger train escaped injury Friday when five coaches were derailed by a safety switch as the train rolled toward an open draw bridge.

The six-car local train, en route from Stamford to New York's Grand Central Terminal had just left the Cos Cob station and was moving about 15 miles an hour when it hit the derailment point.

None of the cars overturned when they rumbled off the track about a quarter of a mile from the open bridge across the Mianus River.

The bridge had been opened a few minutes before to permit a tugboat to pass.

A spokesman for the railroad said signal lights tied in with the drawbridge were in operation and that the train apparently went through them.

Two were fined \$10 and costs for operating a motor vehicle "without due care and attention."

Wellington Fire Loss Is \$15,000

WELLINGTON — A combined garage and service station at Wellington owned by Edward J. Arsenault was levelled by fire Thursday noon with the loss estimated in the vicinity of \$15,000.

Included in the loss were two motor vehicles and large stock of tires, storage batteries and other merchandise.

The owner discovered the fire on returning from a visit to Summerside about 11:30 a.m. and shortly after two drums of gasoline exploded making it apparent that nothing could be done to save the new building which was constructed last summer.

The fire is believed to have started from an exploding oil stove.

The RCAF Fire Department quickly responded to a call and smothered the blazing ruins with foam and prevented further spread of the fire. They were joined by a pumper from the Summerside fire Department shortly after who also rendered assistance.

The gas tanks in front of the service station and the underground storage tanks were not involved in the fire.

The two vehicles lost were owned by Dr. Raymond Reid, whose new jeep was located in the garage and a car owned by Leo Gallant.

Fires take a heavy toll of life and property in Canada every year. To help reduce this staggering loss we recommend you remember and keep posted the following common-sense safety rules:

1. Keep matches and all inflammable materials in safe places and out of reach of children.
2. Never use coal oil, gasoline or other inflammable liquids to start or pep up a fire.
3. Examine and replace chimney pipes at least once a year.
4. Never place hot ashes in anything but metal containers.
5. If a fire starts in your house — give the alarm promptly. Shut in the fire if you can, by closing doors, windows and transoms to prevent a draft. If the fire is small, try to smother it with a coat, rug or blanket — or use water.
6. If the blaze is from gasoline or any other inflammable liquid do not use water. This fire can only be smothered.
7. Don't check a stove or furnace until red flame is showing.
8. Never leave rags or paper near a stove or furnace.
9. Don't overload electric wiring.
10. Tell children what to do in case of fire — before it happens — and repeat it every week.
11. Don't panic.
