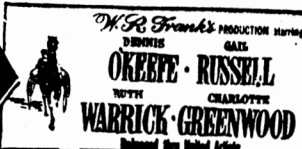

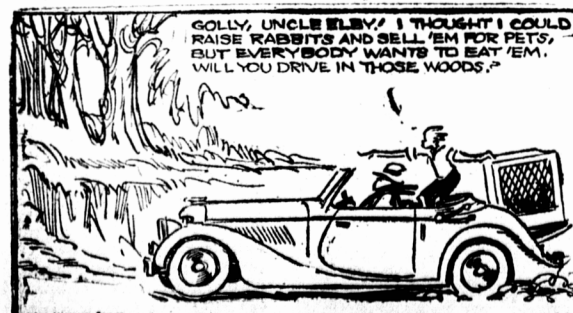

The revealed assets of the testator's estate amount to about \$26,000. The codicil bequeaths \$12,000 to testator's brother A. J. Jardine in Victoria Bonds, and a mortgage of \$3,000 to his sister Bessie Jay, without making any declaration as to how these new bequests are to tie in with

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stances invoking a suspicion of undue influence, but that he rather found evidence from which it might be inferred that the sudden injection of such a large benefit to the testator's brother, substantially undermining, as His Honour found it did, the life interest previously bequeathed to Carrie, indicated an absence of the normal and rational mentality necessary to constitute testamentary capacity. Unfortunately, however, the 'invited inquiry', which could be adequately conducted only by the examination of the principal beneficiaries of the codicil, was not forthcoming, and His Honour was left to unravel the tangle by references to stray bits of random evidence which throw no light on the apparently new relationship

Case For Executor

"(3) The case for the Executor was conducted mainly by his senior counsel, who was also the principal witness examined on behalf of the will. "This circumstance enabled him to cross-examine opposing witnesses, to make comments on the points where their evidence differed from his, and occasionally to make additional statements of fact, no doubt inadvertently, to supplement his explanation of discrepancies between their testimony and his own. Such a situation unquestionably aggravates the unsatisfactory state of the evidence as a whole. (See A. S. 1911, p. 11; An. Pr. 1938, p. 2689; 1943, p. 2771).

"From the cumulative effect of the reasons which I have outlined, I am of the opinion that there should be a new trial. "Per curiam: The Court adjudge that the pronouncement of the learned Judge of Probate for the will and codicil as the last will of a competent testator be set aside, and that a new trial be ordered. The costs of both parties on this appeal will be paid out of the estate, but no senior counsel fee will be allowed to the Respondent in respect of the argument in Court. The costs of the former trial below and of the new trial, will be in the discretion of the Judge of Probate at the termination of the new trial. "Counsel in the case were: for the appellants, K. M.
