up over the dinner table or at the factory.

"The life of a lobster is not long in any case," continued the story teller. "You know, they are regular cannibals, often eating each other up when they are young out shellers, and lobster spawn is a favourite dish of the eating tribe; so, you see, with one enemy or another, always pursuing the youngsters, one often wonders how any of them manages to escape."

"When a lobster shed its shell, how does it protect its tender body?" I questioned.

"It finds itself a nice soft mud bed and stays there till a new shell is grown, which takes quite a while. I am not prepared to say just how long it does take. You could find any amount of empty shells or bones lying about the shore, and farmers often spread these on their fields for fertilizer."

Religion And Life

The train journey through the mountains and across the prairies in mid-winter starts one into thoughtfulness these days. There we were perfectly comfortable in well-equipped cars, with every necessity generously met, thrilled with the grandeur of the snow on the mountains and amazed at the reports we heard of the cold on the prairies.

But men were facing the risks of snowslide and the storm in order that our journey might be unbroken, and men were frostbitten attending to our trains at forty or forty-five below that we might travel in warmth and ease.

Rarely do we appreciate at its full value the preciousness of services into which our fellows put their lives. The soldier risked everything that we might enjoy our freedom, and many made the supreme sacrifice in defense of our homes and altars, and rightly we magnify their heroism. But too often we overlook ministries equally self-forgetful which are offered at every turn of the way.

A story from the ancient world may correct us here. Those of us who were accustomed to roam the fields and woods in boyhood remember gratefully springs from which we used to drink and often in our weariness we long for the cooling draughts that refreshed us in days gone by. Well, King David, at the close of a day's hard fighting exclaimed, "O that someone would only give me a drink of water from the well at Bethlehem—a well beside the gate."

At that moment Bethlehem was occupied by a Philistine garrison. But four of his young men eager for adventure and devoted to their chief, broke through the Philistine guard and brought him water from that spring. David was moved to the depths; water for which his own comrades had risked their lives was too sacred to him for even parched lips to touch. So he poured it out as a perfect offering to God and hallowed his action with this prayer: "Far be it from me that I should do this! It is the blood of men who went at the peril of their lives!"

The insight of that soldier-saint of ancient days rarely found finer expression. The man of war recognized what is often forgotten by the man of peace—the exceeding preciousness of service offered at the risk, or cost, of life.

How often service of this quality is offered in our time and accepted as a matter of course! An epidemic breaks out in an Indian encampment in the far north, and immediately a nurse volunteers her services and dedicates her scientific

knowledge and skill to relieve the sufferers and to stop the progress of the plague. In many cases this past winter fire has broken out in homes, and men and women have plunged into rooms filled with smoke and flame to rescue the aged or the child. A new force is discovered in nature which will do wonders for mankind when understood and controlled and scientists knowing full well that a single mistake may expose their own lives to deadly thrust. Consider, for example, the number of martyrs which our conquest of the air has cost. There is not an advance in modern civilization which has not been made at the risk, or cost, of the lives of our best.

It is a mistake, however, to magnify the consequences of the deed at the cost of its governing motives or principle. With some the self-giving which sometimes results in sacrifice means self-enlargement and gratifying results. In fact, Jesus pointed out on more occasions than one that self-sacrifice is the way to self-realization.

The degree of any parent's influence is the sincerity behind the instruction and counsel given. Two of the most effective teachers in Canada demanded from their students mastery of the technicalities of their subject in a way that astonished observers, but what shaped those students' minds was the soul quality of the teacher—his passion for truths and ideals in the subjects taught.

A listener once complained about the powerlessness of a speech, perfect in form but lacking in fire, and a friend commented, "I perceived that virtue did not go out of him." The orator who would reproduce his convictions in his audience must throw himself into his oratory; when Winston Churchill staked every personal interest and ambition to arouse the spirit of Britain to maintain her freedom, his words were like sledgehammer blows, driving the message home to every heart. Only by self-giving can any service reach its highest effectiveness, and the glory of our race is that this is so often given.

What is Christianity anyway but salvation by sacrifice? At its fount is the self-giving of the Son of God which, through the wickedness of men, culminated in the Cross. The key principle of the Christian ethic is the believer's self-investment in others' self-realization. The story of the founding of Christianity in pagan countries abounds in instances of supreme self-sacrifice for the highest good of the people. Many incidents have been related of the establishment of the Christian
