## DECLARATION IN EAST QUEEN'S.

Today at 10 o'clock, the returning officer at Southport, opened his court for the purpose of summing up the vote given at the late election and of declaring the candidate having the highest number of votes as elected. The declaration, however, was postponed at 12 o'clock until Monday, the 26th November at 10 o'clock, owing to the alleged failure of two deputy returning officers to enclose in the ballot boxes the usual statement of their polls. This adjournment was made in order that the deputy returning officers might be compelled to appear and give the state of the poll at their respective polls. The defaulting officers are Bruce Leitch of Stanhope, who was the deputy at Covehead, and a Mr. Crane, who was deputy at Cherry Valley.

In the 32 polls which were allowed the vote stands:

giving a majority of 2 for Martin, with the two polls above referred to still to be counted. The two polls gave Martin 124 votes and McKinnon 116 votes, a majority of 8 for Martin which added to the 2 of a majority which he has in the 32 polls all already allowed elects Martin by a majority of 10.

It is to be hoped that measures will be taken to enforce the penal parts of the Election Law against returning officers and deputy returning officers who fail to perform the duties assigned to them by the statute.

—Ernest Munn, of Wood Islands, left his home on Friday last and went to Pictou in a schooner. Yesterday his lifeless body was brought home. He had been killed by the midnight express coming into Pictou the night before. The deceased was only 19 years of age, and his death under such circumstances is deeply regretted.

—One of the government organs announces that Mr. Girard, who was elected in Chicoutimi as a conservative, has offered his support to the government. The St. John Sun remarks that "if this true the dominion opposition will have only four French speaking representatives from Quebec province."

—A Moncton despatch says: Rev. J. M. Forbes, Church of England minister, late of Alberton and Crapaud, passed through Moncton on his way to Belmont, New York, where he has accepted a pastorate. Mr. Forbes was accompanied by Mrs. Forbes and their family of son and five daughters. Belmont is a smart little town near Buffalo.

—It will be pleasing to the friends of Mrs. Hugh McLean, of Dundas, who has been seriously ill in Boston where she is visiting her daughter, Mrs. D. H. Stewart, to hear that she is convalescing and it is thought that she will soon be all right again. Mrs. McLean is under the care of Dr. Miles Martin, of Boston, a former resident of Montague.

—The ratepayers of Pleasant Grove School District intend having a grand basket social on Wednesday November 28th, in aid of the school fund. An up-to-date programme, consisting of dialogues, recitations, and vocal and instrumental music has been prepared. Admission ten cents. Ladies with baskets free. Doors open at 6.30 p.m., performance at 7 o'clock sharp. Come all and spend a pleasant evening.

—Stanley Austin, aged 24 years, of Chipman, Queen's county, N. B., was killed last week at Chesuncook, Me., by a tree falling on him. The body was sent home for interment. He had been working in the lumber woods. This was his first season away from home, and it is said he came away against his mother's wish. Only a few days before the accident he received a letter from his mother entreating him to return, stating that she had dreamed that after having been away a few weeks he was brought back dead.

—Evan and Chas. Thompson, owners of the Colonial gold mine at Renfrew, N. S., are the possessors of a gold brick weighing 2,700 ounces and valued at \$54,000. It is the largest brick of gold ever found in Nova Scotia, and it came from 110 tons of quartz. To secure it the owners spent \$1,800, giving them a margin of \$52,000. During the past three months this mine has yielded \$70,000 in gold from an expenditure of \$3,000 and with less than a score of men working. The property consists of 300 acres and only a small corner has been worked. The lead is a bonanza and will be fully developed at once. Its prospective yield is estimated in the millions.
