**PROSECUTIONS THREATENED**

**80 Publications Swept Off Newsstands In N.S.**

HALIFAX (CP) — A radio gospel preacher's threat to lay charges and a Crown prosecutor's opinion on what constitutes obscenity have swept about 80 United States and Canadian publications off the racks of Nova Scotia newsstands in the last three weeks.

Leaders of clergy, authors and teachers groups call the move "one-man censorship" and "pressure-group tactics." The wholesale magazine distributor involved says there should be some better method of dealing with the question.

Rev. Perry Rockwood of Halifax says charges were dropped when the distributor, H. H. Marshall Limited, agreed to remove certain publications from sale. This decision, he says, was taken at a meeting with Peter Hickey, Halifax Crown prosecutor, Detective Superintendent Roy Mitchell of the Halifax police and Charles Marshall, vice-president and managing director of Marshall's, the chief magazine distributor in Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland.

**LEADS GOSPEL HOUR**  
Mr. Rockwood's People's Gospel Hour is broadcast on 47 North American radio stations. They include 20 stations in Canada and the 16-station Yankee network in the U.S.

Mr. O'Hearn says Mr. Marshall asked him to examine certain publications and say which of them, in his opinion, were obscene in terms of the Canadian Criminal Code.

Publications removed from the stands include the Canadian papers Flash, Hush and Midnight, such U.S. periodicals as Playboy, Escapade, Genui, Scope, Photomas, Dude and Cavalier and some pocket-size books.

Rev. Max DeWolfe, Baptist president of the Halifax-Dartmouth Ministerial Association, says he does not like "this type" "I have no axe to grind for these magazines so far as content is concerned but I feel this can be carried to the point where a small group could deprive the public of worthwhile publications."

He says education provides a more positive approach to the question, censorship a negative one.

**PREFERS BOARD**  
Dorcas Hatfield, president of

the Nova Scotia branch of the Canadian Authors Association, says authors in general are opposed to any form of censorship, especially "one-man censorship." A board similar to those that censor motion pictures would be better, he feels.

Tom Parker, executive secretary of the Nova Scotia Teachers Union, says he cannot speak for the union, but in his opinion "any action against satirical literature should be open and above-board, not the result of any small pressure group."

Mr. Marshall says he feels an advisory committee on literature similar to those in Ontario and Alberta. An Ontario committee set up two years ago comprises an English professor, a lawyer, a librarian and a sociologist.

The committee would recommend for or against a specific publication when asked by any citizen. Distributors and newsstand operators would have the committee's advice, although not legally bound to accept it.

**Island Oysters Are Planted In Shediac Bay**

SHEDAC, N.B. (CP) — About 600 cases of Prince Edward Island oysters have been dumped into Shediac Bay to see if the area's oyster industry can be

revived. Mayor Joseph Landry said here small seed oysters and large oysters have been placed in the bay during the past few days by the fisheries department to find out if they can survive conditions in the bay.

At one time there were large numbers of high quality oysters in Shediac Bay. A survey found

that the beds were becoming heavily silted as a result of drainage from the land and that the larvae produced from the oysters were drifting into the straits and not settling in the bay to rebuild the population.

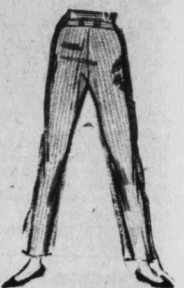
