Allan MacLeod of Mount Hope who placed second in the championship class last year, came close again yesterday. He finished third in the event.

16 year old Glen Morrissey proved that his score of 97 points at the Mount Mellick Plowing Match a week ago was no fluke. Young Morrissey finished fourth in the big class yesterday and plowed the best finish.

Keenly Contested

The high quality of plowing kept the three judges, Messrs. D. C. Schurman and Norman Black of the Experimental Farm here and W. W. Baird from making any quick decisions. The three men walked up and down the field a dozen or more times comparing notes and holding conferences before they finally announced the placings to the eager crowd.

Harley Ings of Mount Herbert, a winner in the Queens County Plowing Match, plowed the straightest furrow yesterday. The judges said there were about five furrows that were all as straight as a ruler and Mr. Baird said they were the straightest he ever saw.

The award for the best crown went to the plowing king, Mr. Clay. In speaking of crowns Mr. Baird said he liked to see the six centre sods so even you could lay a ruler on them.

Truelove Taylor of Upton, an old hand at winning firsts at the plowing matches won the single furrow competitions. Wallace Taylor, also of Upton placed second and Allie Campbell of Primrose third. The straightest furrow, best crown and best finish were plowed by Truelove Taylor.

Mr. Taylor's son Wylie took the top honors in the gang plow class, for boys under 18. Carl Shepherd of Forest Hill placed second.

Bellevue Man Passes Away

The funeral of the late John A. MacPhee, Bellevue, who passed away in the King's County Hospital Sunday evening, was held from 8 o'clock to 10 o'clock at the Presbyterian Church Wednesday afternoon and was conducted by Rev. E. S. Hales.

Rev. Mr. Hales took as his text John 14: 10 and spoke words of comfort and inspiration to the bereaved family. Mrs. Alan Cameron presided at the organ, and the hymns were "The Lord's My Shepherd," "Shall We Gather At The River" and "Asleep In Jesus."

Mr. MacPhee leaves to mourn his passing one daughter, Margaret, Mrs. Lorne Stewart, Murray Harbour, and three sons, Malcolm B. in Bellevue, Alex in Grandview and William R. in Toronto. One sister, Mrs. Ronald MacLean, Los Angeles, California, also survives. Interment took place in Valleyfield Cemetery.

Baird, J. B. Reid and Leslie Hunter, President of the Association spoke briefly.

Mr. Shaw, after speaking about the progressive development of the match, stated that he did not think that there was another agricultural feature in Prince Edward Island that could compare with the Dundas Plowing Match.

He expressed his delight with the development of the meet and reminded them that the assembly of eight or ten thousand people in Dundas for an agricultural plowing match was quite a feat.

Mr. Baird told the crowd that he was complimented in being asked to judge the plowing at Dundas year after year. He stated that every man who took part in the championship class did an excellent job and that not one of them should be ashamed of his plowing.

He warned the people against a growing evil, that of wanting to get their work done for nothing and of getting clear of work. I hope that every girl and boy in this country will want to do an honest day's work if Canada is to develop into a great nation he stated.

Comments Horses
Mr. J. B. Reid, who judged the horses stated that the quality of the horses this year was much better than last. He advised each farmer to keep a pair of heavy horses and congratulated the manager and director of the show for their splendid work.

Mr. Hunter thanked everyone who had aided in making the show a success, especially the newspapers. He also thanked the large numbers who attended.
