Brothers Die Of Gas Poisoning

ST. LOUIS (AP)—An autopsy Wednesday disclosed that a fire-eating baccaorist was found dead in their old-fashioned home here died of carbon monoxide poisoning. Authorities reported the home was tightly closed and a fire in a coal heating stove had burned out when the bodies of the Hoening brothers—Charles, 62, George, 64, and Henry, 67—were discovered Tuesday night. The bodies, clad in underclothing, were in beds.

Police returned to the home after the autopsy in an effort to locate the source of the fumes in the three-storey brick house in George Hoening, a bookkeeper, was the only one employed. Charles was deaf and acted as the housekeeper. He took care of Henry, who was blind. Police were called after Eric R. Kenney, an officer of the firm which employed George Hoening, was unable to rouse any of the occupants of the house when he went there to find out why George hadn't been at work since Thursday.

Three Little Brothers Die In Home Fire

ST. PIERRE, Man. (CP)—Three young brothers, terrified as flame and smoke funneled up a stairway and afraid to jump from windows, were trapped in the second storey of their frame home Wednesday and died as the blazing building crashed to the ground.

Their parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Arpin, both 32, Mrs. Arpin's brother, Roland Turcotte, a sister and three other brothers all managed to escape in their night attire and were helpless in their attempts to save the victims.

Dead are Richard, 3, Guy, 4, and Luke, 5, who were sleeping on the second floor of the house. Marcel, 6, and Roger, 9, asleep on the first floor also escaped unhurt. Upstairs, Noel, 10, smashed his way through two windows and jumped clear. He suffered second-degree burns and cuts and was in satisfactory condition in St. Rochelle Hospital.

FELL INTO FLAMES
Mr. Turcotte, asleep with Richard, tried to rescue him by smashing a window and making him jump.

"Richard screamed and ran away from me to the head of the stairs," he said. "I tried to catch him but he slipped on the top step and rolled over and over down the stairs into the flames below." Mr. Turcotte then jumped out of the window and tried to force his way through the front door but the fire drove him back.

Believe British Surplus Tanks Shipped To Egypt

LONDON (Reuters)—Britain "has reason to believe" that between 180 and 190 surplus army tanks sent from the United Kingdom to Belgium have been shipped to Egypt, a foreign office spokesman said Wednesday. The spokesman, replying to questions on a published report here on the extent of the shipments of 16-ton Valentine tanks through Antwerp, said they had been made "during the past six months." The foreign office said last week that Britain now was enforcing more stringent controls on the export of surplus military equipment. The tanks, sold as scrap, had been reconditioned in Belgium. The new restrictions—which have already held up one cargo of surplus military equipment being sent from Britain—make it necessary to disclose the ultimate destination of such equipment.

Stolen Diary Of Poet Returned

DETROIT (AP)—The \$25,000 Wal Whitman manuscript diary, stolen from a Detroit public library exhibit last March 4, was returned by mail Wednesday. Ralph A. Ulveling, library director, said the valuable diary, owned by Charles M. Feinberg of Detroit, was returned to the main library in a plain brown manila envelope. It was postmarked from suburban St. Clair Shores. Ulveling said an unsigned note was stuck between the pages. It read: "Dear sir, 'This book was not stolen. I am sorry I didn't return it sooner.' Yugoslavs And Egyptians Confer

CAIRO (AP)—Talk of neutralism and peaceful coexistence dominated the first day's meeting of the men who will speak on friendship between Yugoslavia and Egypt. Soon after President Tito arrived Wednesday to begin his state visit to Prime Minister Gamal Abdel Nasser's Egypt it became clear the two leaders consider their countries closely linked by mutual devotion to absolute independence externally and revolutionary programs internally.

New U. S. Measures Re Farm Surplus Program

WASHINGTON (Reuters)—The United States Tuesday informed representatives of Canada, New Zealand, Denmark, Australia, Sweden and Holland of new steps to be taken in the American farm surplus disposal program. Observers noted that all countries represented at a session in the state department were large products and exporters of dairy products. It was understood that the United States, through Thorsten Kahjarvi, the acting deputy under-secretary of state, gave them advance information about intended dairy disposals, primarily affecting butter and cheese. The United States already has sold some 10,000,000 pounds of sur-

FIRST RECEIVERS AND HANDLERS
OF POULTRY PRODUCTS
Your attention is directed to the following regulations under the Poultry and Poultry Products Act:

- No person shall carry on business as a first receiver of poultry products unless he is the holder of a valid and subsisting license issued by the Minister and authorizing him to conduct such business. For the purposes of this regulation each branch premises shall be regarded as a separate establishment and shall require a separate license. The fee for a first receiver's license and for the renewal thereof shall be 25 cents.
- No person shall carry on business as a wholesaler of poultry products unless he is the holder of a valid and subsisting license issued by the Minister and authorizing him to conduct such business. Such license in its original form shall be kept at the head premises of the licensee and a duplicate thereof in every branch premises. The fee for a wholesaler's license and for the renewal thereof shall be 25 cents.
- Applications for a license under these regulations shall be made to the Minister in a form prescribed by him.
- Every license issued under these regulations shall expire on the thirty-first day of December following the date of issue if not previously revoked for infringement of the P.E.I. Poultry and Poultry Products Act or any regulation made thereunder or for any other reason in conformity with the authority vested in the Minister by virtue of Section 4 of the said Act.

BRUSSELS (Reuters)—Two European air lines announced Wednesday orders for the new four-engine Boeing jet intercontinental strato-liners from the United States. Belgium's Sabena Airlines ordered three of the 575-mile-per-hour jetliners and Air France agreed to buy 10 of the aircraft more than \$70,000,000. Delivery of the jets is scheduled to begin in 1959.
