A sellout gathering of 13,900 watched the Rangers snap a five-game Boston unbeaten string and prevent the home forces from bettering their fourth-place standing.

The game was loosely played with four goals scored in less than eight minutes after the opening face-off.

Colwill has scored four of his six major league goals at the expense of Boston. He was a 35-goal man at Saskatoon last season.
