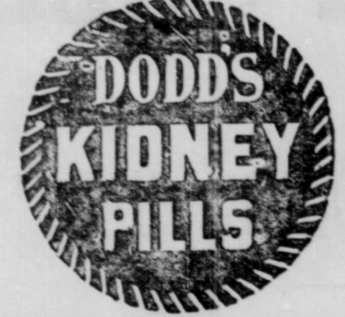

LONDON'S CABBIERS.

THE PHILOSOPHY OF GETTING ABOUT

In the World's Metropolis—Hackney Coaches and Liners—The Piccadilly Bus—Hansom Cabs Are Very Popular—London Has Few Street Cars and These Give But a Wretched Service.

Dancing has been described as the poetry of motion, and perhaps it was at the time the description was penned; but that was some time ago. To-day it is poetry in a rubber-tired hansom cabs over a wood-paved London street. For miles you glide along, scarcely conscious of your own existence, and you can see a fine view of the city from the top of a Piccadilly bus. No conversation is ever interrupted by a driver in London. Indeed, if you want a quiet walk, you can take a friend the best way to get them is to take a cab. There, unless there is something in your manner to excite the driver's curiosity or suspicion, which may induce him to open the trap door in the top of the cab and listen, you are as secluded as you would be in your own boudoir. I don't know how many hansom cabs there are in London, but I know that there are at least 13,845, for I saw that number on the back of one. So that you are never at a loss for them.

London cabbies as a rule, are very amiable disposed toward their fares. They may sometimes overcharge you, but they do it with a deprecating air that makes it possible for you to refuse their fare. In this respect they are very different from the French "cocher," he takes you by the throat, as it were, and it is your money or your life. I have seen a French cabbie in London, though I would not go so far as to say that none are to be found there. They will always take you where you want to go, which is more than they will do in Paris. It is as much as you can do to get a French "cocher" to drive you to the Bois. They don't like long trips; for they are paid by the hour for their "course," which is something that only they know the mystery of. A London cabbie, whom I asked to take me a five mile distance one day and suggested that I engage him by the hour, expostulated with me so gently yet so convincingly that I at once yielded to his superior wisdom. You will not gain anything by engaging us by the hour," said he. "When we have our fares we leave; but if you take us by the hour, we will stay with you until you get tired." I liked his candor, and there was something about the editorial "we" that divided the responsibility of that other "might have been" started as a personal peculiarity, which was reassuring. Being in a hurry, as Americans usually are, I agreed to his terms, and I am sure that I profited by the arrangement.

There is talk in London of furnishing every cab and four-wheeler with an indicator, the invention of an unsympathetic German, which will not only indicate the number of miles traveled, but the price that should be paid for the privilege. The indicator is said to be infallible; but I think that there will be occasions when the cabbies will dispute its infallibility. But there is always Mr. Asquith to arbitrate. It is also said the indicator will be introduced in Paris. It will be a bold man who tries it there. I see a revolution ahead when it is attempted.

The London cabbie is not so elegant a person as the London "bus" driver. He does not dress so smartly, nor hold himself as well. His coat is seldom buttoned, and he usually wears a "bobby" hat; but he keeps his cab looking neat and his horse, unless he drives a "growler," is sleek and strong looking. Mr. Labouchere, with that recklessness of reasoning which goes with radical mind, is very anxious to have the law rescinded which prohibits common hackney coaches, as they are called, entering Hyde Park. He says that Hyde Park is not meant for the masses as for the classes, and that it is unjust to keep out carriages because the coachmen are not in livery. Of course this is all talk, and no one knows it better than Mr. Labouchere, but he thinks that it pleases his constituents, though I do not. In the first place hackney coaches are forbidden to drive through Hyde Park because it would crowd the drive so that it would be impossible to move. As it is, there is very little comfort in driving there at the fashionable hours. If cabs were allowed, private carriages would be forced to go somewhere else and that would not please the masses. They go to Hyde Park to see the fine carriages and the smart costumes of the ladies, and they would be the first to cry out if that privilege was denied them. They can come into the park on foot, and sit or stand, and see the show, and be on the grass or row on the Serpentine, and any gentleman can drive his own trap there; but if he had a coachman, the coachman must wear a livery. The English people like this, and if the question came to a vote, I believe they would decide against the hackney coaches; and for two reasons, one because it would be going against tradition, the other because it would spoil one of the finest sights in the world.

Eight years ago when I was in London for the first time, women did not ride on the tops of the "busses;" that is not all women. They might ride inside if they had not mind suffocating; but only the lower class ever climbed to the roof. It was a climb if you liked. But all this is now changed and the bus tops have as many women on them as there are seats. A well-built stairway runs to the top; and if the conductor doesn't give the signal to start before you get to your seat, you won't mind the ascent with ease and grace. At first you may be a little awkward, and if you have an umbrella in one hand and a parcel in the other, you may find it difficult to get your seat. But you will get used to it, and you will be able to sit on a bus as comfortably as you can sit on a chair.

It doesn't seem much of a snap to be a guard on a Brooklyn Bridge car when the trolley is carrying a big effort to get its own record. But the trolley is not so badly off after all, their uniforms being made with an interlining of Fibre throughout, and with this comforting protection they can enjoy even the wildest days without suffering from cold. 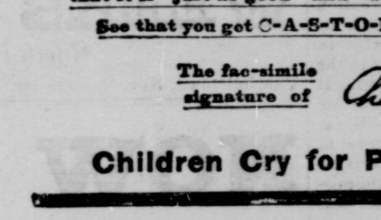
