Secord MP Keeps CNR Issue Alive

OTTAWA (CP)—The Social Credit MP who sparked the current controversy over the lack of French-Canadian in the CNR management is not letting the matter die.

Gilles Grezior, Lapointe, has given notice in the Commons journal of this question: "Has any consideration ever been given to the appointment of French-Canadians among the 28 officers of the Canadian National Railways and, if so, (A) when (B) who was considered for such appointment (C) what was the substance of the decision made in each case?"

Following that notice, the Transport Minister Balcer will refer the question to the public-opinion poll of the government set at some future date.

INITIATES EXCHANGE

OTTAWA (CP)—When CNR Premier Donald Gordon made his annual appearance before the Commons railway committee, Mr. Grezior initiated an angry exchange when he noted none of the CNR's top 28 executives was French-Canadian. He suggested this was discrimination.

Mr. Grezior said he had written a letter to the appointment of French-Canadian applicants for these positions. He added that as long as I am president of the CNR, there is not going to be a shouting of base such decisions on.

Since then Mr. Gordon has been turned in effigy by students at Ottawa, Montreal, Quebec and Sherbrooke. And the CNR's Social Credit leader Real Casseotte introduced a bill in the Commons Thursday to reduce Mr. Gordon's salary to \$1 from \$75,000.

MPs Claimed Often Bored

MONTREAL (CP)—John Pratt, a former member of Parliament, said here a group of members in Ottawa, "bored with its own inadequacy, has often been found drinking or playing cards in some remote member's office."

He was commenting in a radio broadcast on recent charges that some members of a parliamentary delegation to the last NATO conference in Paris were "ill-prepared, often uninterested, and sometimes untruthful."

The charges, made in Montreal, stressed that a certain number of delegates were not seen at any time during the conference, and that some were sleeping in Picalle and sleeping by day.

"I have many shucks awaiting a conscientious Member of Parliament," Mr. Pratt said, "one of the greatest in fact and number of elected representatives."

In assessing his prospects in suit contracts, the declarer is usually better off if he starts by counting his losers. In most hands this will give him a clearer idea of where he stands and what he has to do than if he starts by counting his winners.

However, this is a rule of convenience only, and the declarer should feel free to readjust his sights when the occasion calls.
