NOTEBOOK
A MOST UNUSUAL FABRIC

Scientists have been turning out miraculous inventions with such speed and ingenuity of late that I'm sure a sizeable proportion of the population would politely stifle a yawn if they were told that the latest scientific gift to mankind was a motorless motor car, a heatless electric light bulb, or possibly the legendary perpetual motion machine.

But if you are still among those who shake their heads in mild disbelief whenever another miracle is brought out of the lab prepare yourself for a short spell of head-shaking. This time it's the textile industry that has done it—and what it has done is produce a non-woven fabric.

Maybe that sounds like too much of a contradiction in terms, since a fabric—by definition—would seem to be a woven material.

But that just isn't so, in this case, because the fibers are bonded together with a resin and then spread into a flat, smooth sheet that can be both useful and attractive when made into such items as coat linings, petticoats, and linings for intricate dresses of satin, taffeta and others.

All of which calls for a brief word from the Better-Safe-Than-Sorry Dept.: These non-woven fabrics, often being pigment printed, can put severe limitations on what a dry cleaner can do in removing spots, for the cleaning materials he must use will sometimes remove the design as well as the spot.

And even when they are non-inflammable, non-woven fabrics can be ruined in seconds by hot cigarette ashes because holes cannot be mended even by the most expert tailor or dressmaker.

All of which means that even the wonders of science have their limitations, and our basic rule still holds true: Buy clothes with caution and don't subject a fabric to wear, tear or soiling which it was never intended to withstand.
