BE PREPARED.

The tide of political opinion in the Second District of Queen's is now running strongly against the Pineau-Farquharson Government and in favor of the farmer-candidate. This will only intensify the efforts of those who are, by every means, trying to corrupt the electorate and preparing "to work the machine" on election day. The friends of Mr. Wise must therefore, if they are to succeed, be fully organized and prepared to prevent the success of the Government schemes. We fear that it will be necessary to put the bribery oath to many of the men who will come forward to vote for the doctor candidate.

**NOTES AND COMMENTS.**

—By the death of Hon. A. R. Dickey, Canada has lost one of her ablest and most promising public men.

—At the political meeting at Hunter River last week, notwithstanding the agreement as to the duration of speeches, it appears that a leading Conservative farmer was arbitrarily confined to one-half the time allowed speakers on the other side. The protestations of the Conservatives were disregarded and the question of their right to speak settled in a very high-handed manner by a local military man, who took it upon himself to prevent the opposition speakers being heard. Are the men of the sword, in other words men holding commissions in our militia, allowed to take a leading part at political meetings?

Albert E. Douglas M. D., nominated by William Laird, Esq., seconded by Patrick J. McManus of New Haven and supported by Archibald Warren, and Lemuel Clarkin.

**SUPREME COURT.**

WEDNESDAY, July 4th.

The Queen vs. William Welsh. Burglary with intent to commit indecent assault on Harriet Farquharson. Verdict of July—not guilty. Attorney-General McKinnon for Crown; J. T. Mellish for prisoner.

The Queen vs. Wm. Welsh. Burglary and attempt to commit indecent assault on Christy McDonald. Mr. Mellish, counsel for defence, moves that deposition before commissioner to take statement of a material witness be not received, and also that indictment be quashed on the ground of mistakes in regard to Christian name of Miss McDonald.

Court decides not to receive deposition as filed and orders a new commission to take same over again; also amends indictment. Attorney-General for crown; J. T. Mellish for defendant.

**MARRIAGE BELLS.**—The marriage of Prof. Edward E. Jordan, of the Prince of Wales College staff, and Miss Minnie Well took place this morning at the bride's home. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. G. P. Raymond. The bride was Miss Lea, of Tryon, while the maids of honor were the bride's sisters, Ethel and Lottie. The bride's wedding gown was of cream silk with cream satin trimmings. The groom was attended by Mr. Thos. Layton, of Winsloe. Mr. and Mrs. Jordan left this morning by the express for Montreal and the United States.

**GREAT MEETING**

**AT RUSTICO.**

**Crisis of the Campaign.**

**GREAT SUCCESS FOR THE OPPOSITION.**

DesRoches, Shaw and Others Score the Government — Farquharson and His Candidate Leave the Meeting—The "Whiskey Trick" that Didn't Succeed.

The spacious hall at Rustico was crowded last evening by the farmers and fishermen of the vicinity and by others interested in the campaign. We regret to say that among the latter were a few who had been primed with whiskey—and who did their best towards the close of the meeting to bring the good name of Rustico into disrepute by fighting and disorder at the back of the hall. It is stated that these were, without exception, followers of the Government.

Ephraim Gallant, Esq., occupied the chair.

Mr. Wise, the Farmer and Opposition candidate, made his statement clearly and satisfactorily.

He was followed by Dr. Douglas who said that he was proud to be a supporter of the Farquharson Government and took credit to the grit in office for everything that Liberals have ever done for the country, from Responsible Government and Free Education to the building (after years of delay) of the annex to the Lunatic Asylum. In passing, he appealed to French feeling on behalf of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and referred to the presence of Messrs J. F. Arsenault M. L. A., and Gilbert DesRoches, M. L. A.

This at once brought Mr. Arsenault to his feet. Mr. Arsenault scored the government heavily on their many false and unredeemed pledges and promises—making some very decided hits.

Mr. John Wheat, Law Clerk of the Legislature, followed and prattled about the "great enthusiasm for the government which existed at West River;" and the "great increase in the cost of education to which he attributed all the deficits that have been made by the government, year after year, notwithstanding the taxes wrung from the people. He forgot to say that the number of children educated in the public schools had not increased.

Mr. DesRoches, of Miscouche, then delivered the speech of the evening,—full of fire, eloquence and good points against the Pineau-Farquharson combination. He spoke in terms of admiration of the Rustico settlement and the fine farms by which it was adorned, and said that the farmers of the Province ought to be represented by farmers in the Legislature. As to justice to the French people, of which the doctor candidate had boasted, he referred to the fact that the high position of Senator, to which the Conservatives had appointed the late Hon. Mr. Arsenault, was now occupied by the Hon. John Yeo—the excuse being made that there was not a Frenchman in the party who was fit. For the present Legislature, there are two doors and seven doorkeepers, and not one of these is of French descent. These were samples of the treatment accorded the French by the Liberals in office at Ottawa and Charlottetown. He advised the electors to look to their own interests, to send good farmers to represent farmers' interests, and ended with a stirring appeal on behalf of the farmer-candidate, Mr. Wise.

Mr. Robert Stevenson an elderly gentleman referred to the great measures of Cole and Whelan as reasons why the electors should now vote for the doctor-candidate of the Farquharson Administration.

Mr. John A. McDonald, M. L. A., then addressed the electors, contending that the Tories of the days of Coles and Whelan are the leaders of the grit party of today, and that the Liberals of those days and their descendants are now members of the

Liberal-Conservative Party. By this time, the whiskey which had been brought to the meeting, began to have the effect intended, and there was so much noise and confusion in the rear of the hall that Mr. McDonald was heard with difficulty.

The noise did not cease when the Premier took the floor. Mr. Farquharson had not gone far when a small fight broke out, attracting so much attention that he had to stop. By the efforts of the chairman and others the tray soon ceased. But Mr. Farquharson was in no hurry to begin again. His conduct aroused a suspicion that he would not be averse to have it go abroad, in West River, that he was prevented from speaking at Rustico. But this object was prevented. After much persuasion, Mr. Farquharson continued his address, assailing the Star and THE EXAMINER and doing its best to stir up feeling against Mr. Wise.

It was close upon twelve o'clock when Mr. Shaw began his address which was so racy and pointed that the attention of even those whom the Grits had made drink was commanded for the first fifteen minutes. After that there was some noise, but Mr. Shaw was enabled to conclude his half hour speech amid rounds of applause. It is significant that first Mr. Farquharson and then Dr. Douglass were constrained to leave the meeting while Mr. Shaw was criticizing the Government.

Hon. William Campbell moved the vote of thanks to the chairman,—which Mr. Gallant acknowledged, at the same time denounced the conduct of those who had disturbed the meeting and attempted, wrongfully and unsuccessfully, to bring disgrace upon Rustico.
