AN INDIAN SUMMER

Alfred Austin's Poem in Honor of the Queen

Mr. Alfred Austin has written an ode entitled "Indian Summer" to commemorate the Queen's entrance on her 81st year. It was first printed in America by the New York Herald:—

Springtime was flowering in your fair young face
When first the sceptre laid on its load—
Springtime and seedtime—and how well you sowed
In the rough furrows life's long duties trace,
Scattering with lavish heart and smiles of youth and grace.
Though April sandalled with its flower, your feet,
And sang its amorous descant in your ears,
You, with a foresight wiser than your years,
Bethought you of the time, more serious, sweet,
When mellow fruit is stored and stacked in ripened wheat.
With hearts as tender as the bud half blown,
Yet in the very season of young love,
Kneeling, you sought its impulse from above,
Choosing for consort of your earthly throne
A soul akin to yours, a mind to match your own.

So that when glowed your summer o'er the land,
You, with your people round you, could forecast
Rich-fruiting future planted in the past,
Engaging promise of rule rightly planned,
Of freedom round your shores, and on the sea command.
Then slowly comes the time when summer wanes,
And from the sunshine something seems withdrawn,
As pensive shadows lengthen on the lawn,
When only birdweed lingers in the lane,
The one sweet thing that then unwithered doth remain.
But there is beauty in autumnal bough,
No less than in dear April's dewy leaves,
When, with its store of golden girdled sheaves
Piled, stands the wain where one time passed the plough,
And ripened labor reaps fulfilment of its vow.

For though no more the oblivious cuckoo calls,
From land to land, nor longer on the spray
Of yellowing elm the thrush wants his lay,
The ringdove's mate, as fades the leaf and falls,
Reiterates its note of love that never fails.
From hamlet roofs blue spires of smoke-
once more—
As dies the day in mist along the dale
And widowed evening weeps behind her veil—
From log-replenished ingle heavenward near,
And lamps are early lit and early latched the door.

Season it is less earthly than divine,
When love's rich guerdons with the days increase
And cares are softened 'neath the crown of peace,
When all we have won 'twere easy to resign—
A season like to this, loved Lady, now is thine.
Through life's successive labors, one by one,
Still moving on to-day, no more you roam,
Seeking fresh tasks, but fruit of harvest home,
Fruit blent with flowers, warmed by October's sun,
Are round your throne entwined, and harvest hymns began.

Oh, what a harvest, Lady now is yours!
Empire and fame and glory, and above
Glory and fame a universe's love—
Love rooted deep in reverence that insures
Remembrance of your name as long as time endures.
Long may the Indian summer of your days
Yet linger in the land you love so well,
And long may we, who no less love you, dwell
In the reposeful radiance of your gaze,
A golden sunset seen through autumn's silvery haze.

"In everything that has tended to elevate the tone of public sentiment her Majesty has contributed in no slight degree.

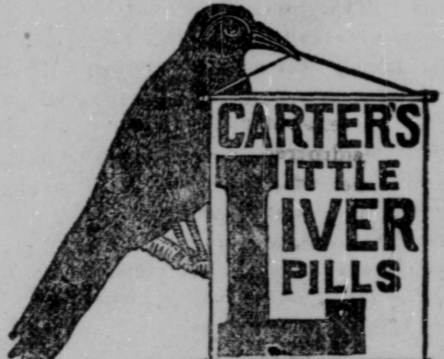
"As a sovereign her Majesty, although administering a system of Parliamentary Government which, during her reign has reached the highest point that Parliamentary Government has ever attained in any country, has yet by her great ability, by her devotion to her public duties, exercised a most potent influence on the administration of the affairs of the Empire.

"And we have every reason to believe that on more than one occasion the influence her Majesty has acquired with ministers of all parties has been such as to determine the fate of the nation towards peace rather than towards war.

"In the prayer for the long life and happiness of her Majesty we will be joined by the peoples of all climes, by the peoples of all races and colours, and of all the sections of the British Empire, and every good man and woman throughout the world will wish long life and happiness to her Majesty the Queen."—Sir Charles Tupper.

—The Montreal Gazette remarks: A license law and a measure to tax steamboat, express, and fire insurance companies were passed at the session of the P. E. I. Legislature just closed. The island's is a Liberal administration. It is illustrating the statement that there has been no Liberal government in Canada, federal or provincial, that has not added to the taxes, increased the expenditure or augmented the debt.

—Hon. Thos. Chapais, one of the most eloquent speakers in the Province of Quebec, delivered a stirring address in French at the great Conservative meeting held at Sherbrooke last Wednesday, in which he scored Sir Wilfrid Laurier. As a French-Canadian, he declared, he was proud to follow Sir Charles Tupper, because the latter was true to his principles, as he did not hold one language in Ontario and another in Quebec. Although Sir Wilfrid was a French Canadian, he, as a French-Canadian, would blush to recognize him as a leader, as he had violated promises he had made to his compatriots in the most shameful manner. Sir Charles had been the real champion of the constitutional rights of the minority, and though defeated he was defeated in a righteous cause. Mr. Chapais also denounced the Senate reform scheme as a gross injustice to Quebec.

Russia's High Hans.

PERIN, May 26.—The Russian Minister here, M. de Glere, has notified the Tsunli-Yamen that Russia is unable to accept the Chinese refusal of a railroad concession, and that she will send engineers forthwith to survey a line to connect.

—Put 50,000 Torontonians on one side of the scale and 14,000 people from Parrv Sound on the other side, and, according to the views of the Ottawa Government, the scales will balance. Torontonians are lightweights, and it would perhaps be better if they were not represented in Parliament at all.
