

Wywrot Paces Atlantics To 10-4 Victory Over Charlottetown Islanders

HALIFAX, (CP) — Paced by veteran Pete Wywrot, Halifax Atlantics blasted Charlottetown Islanders 10-4 Saturday night in a Maritime Major Hockey League game.

The win gave Atlantics their strongest grip this season on first place. They now lead the second-place Sydney Millionaires by 11 points.

Wywrot scored five goals and helped on two to lead Halifax. Bob Bowness tallied twice. The others were scored by Jackie Hollett, Bill Ford, Gene Leclerc, Ross Watson and Johnny Morrow.

Buck Whitlock scored three Charlottetown goals and assisted Bob Gray on the other.

Halifax had scored five times, four in the first period and one in the second, before Islanders got started. Halifax led 8-1 going into the third. Islanders came to life, too late, in the last period, when they outscored Atlantics 3-2.

Roger Bessette made 34 stops for Islanders. Roy McMeekin stopped 20.

Referee Frank O'Donoghue handed out three penalties, all of them in the first period. Two went to Halifax.

Miners Take Lead In 1st Period, Defeat Sydney 3-1

GLACE BAY, N. S. (CP)—Glance Bay Miners capitalized on a first-period lead to hand Sydney Millionaires a 3-1 defeat in a Maritime Major Hockey League game Saturday night.

Miners' victory brought them within six points of the second-place Millionaires.

Tommy Fyles, Ken Watson and Hughie Campbell did Glance Bay's scoring. Lorne Pirie tallied for Sydney.

Fyles started things rolling at 11 minutes in the first period, and Watson scored seven minutes later. Each team got a marker in the second and was scoreless in the third.

Miners steadily outshot the Millionaires. Norm Defelice kept 32 shots out of the Sydney net. Glance Bay's Cliff Hicks stopped 20.

Glance Bay got five of the nine

New Rotary Rink Opens At Park Athletic Centre

Saturday and again yesterday many skaters and hockey players young and old took advantage of the excellent sheet of ice on the Rotary Rink at Memorial Field. The ice surface on this new venture at the city athletic centre measures 190 feet by 78 feet so there is ample room for skating or regulation hockey. A four-foot high cushion has been erected around the rink and now all that those in charge need is co-operation from the weather man.

The clubhouse-canteen at the Field has been renovated to include a pump house for the water supply necessary for future flooding and there are two heated dressing rooms—one for ladies, the other for men. In the event of a large crowd attending any of the skates planned, extra girls missed in this way are asked to phone the Fitness Division or Memorial Field where their name will be taken and they will be assigned to a team.



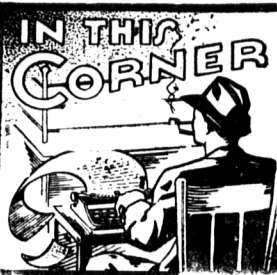
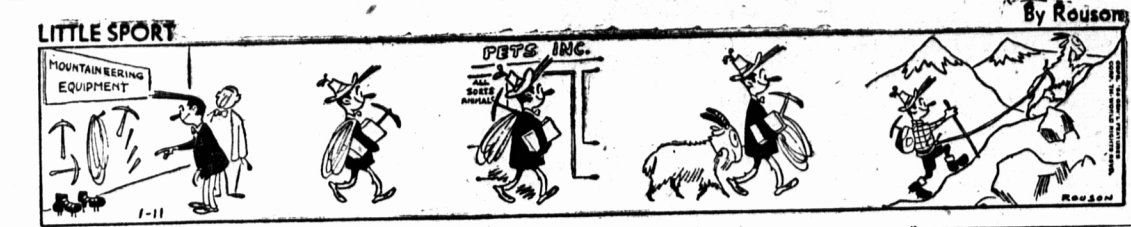

According to the hockey summary the Islanders administered quite a beating to the Glance Bay Miners on Friday night but according to medical reports the Miners handed out a different kind of a beating to the Islanders. For most of the game Claude Robert skated through the Glance Bay team at will but he didn't do it without suffering ill effects. The Miners hammered at his feet with their sticks all night with the result that Claude had to see a doctor on Saturday afternoon and was forced to retire from the game in Halifax on Saturday night.

Trainer Back In Lineup; Robert's Foot Better For Halifax Game Tonight

The Charlottetown Islanders will be out to settle a score with the Halifax Atlantics tonight and the Islanders will be bolstered by the return of coach Bucko Trainor to the line-up plus the hope that Claude Robert's injured toe may be back near normal again.

Trainer, who has been out of the action for the past week has been given medical clearance to return to the ice lanes. He has not played since last Tuesday.

Robert suffered a painful foot injury in the third period of Friday night's game against the Glance Bay Miners when he was slashed across the toes. He was forced to see club physician Dr. Frank A. MacMillan on Saturday afternoon for treatment.

Dr. MacMillan reported that Robert's toe was hemorrhaging under the nail. He told Robert that he probably would not be able to play Saturday night.

Robert told Trainor of his condition and said he would go ahead and give it a try. He was forced to retire from the game in the third period. His injury cut down the effectiveness of the Islanders attack as the usual high scoring string of Robert, Saindon and Carver were unable to connect for a point.

Coach Bucko Trainor reported that the Atlantics were unusually hot with every combination clicking in N. H. L. style.

Trainer also reported that centreman Buck Whitlock turned in

a fine game on the Halifax freeze as the veteran smoothie fired home three goals and assisted on the fourth.

As a result of their loss and the Miners win the Islanders dropped three points behind the Islanders. However, a game in hand on their Glance Bay rivals in the battle for third spot.

The Islanders have been very impressive in their home games of late with their prolific scoring bursts. The last defeat they suffered here came at the hands of the league leading Halifaxians.

A sidelight of tonight's battle will be the point scoring battle between the Atlantics' Billy Ford and Pete Wywrot against the Islanders' Paul Saindon and Buck Whitlock.

Queried about the matter last night Robert stated he was slashed on the ankle about fifteen times and at the last of it he was beginning to think the Miners were trying to break his ankle. They may or they may not have such intentions in mind but they did succeed in cutting Robert's potential down to a minimum for Saturday night's important game against the Atlantics. This served the Miners purpose for they were able to whip the Millionaires while the Atlantics were trouncing the Islanders.

The most vicious looking slash that we saw Robert receiving was a wallop delivered by the Miners' Needham. Robert cut around the defense, skated across the goal mouth and as he went to shoot Needham connected with his stick across Robert's wrist and arm. The offender went unpunished and it's little wonder that Robert protested vigorously. If referee O'Donoghue doesn't start to clamp down on these slashing and stick swinging incidents there's going to be some serious accidents before long.

It's a rather provoking situation for the Islanders. They have been literally flying in recent games and they needed to win that game in Halifax on Saturday or at least make it close. Robert who has been the spark plug of the Islanders attack, usually goes well on Halifax ice. The first time he played there he scored two goals and assisted on two more as the Islanders came from behind to win. Had he been injury-free Saturday the result of the game would have been much different. Now they have less ground on the Miners and have to start a winning drive over again. Last night Dr. Frank MacMillan told us that while Robert's injury was not serious it was quite painful and would slow him down quite a bit for a game or two.

In view of what the Miners did to Robert it's quite possible that Rocket Richard may have some grounds for blasting N. H. L. President Clarence Campbell in his column the other day. It's not so long ago that Jean Beliveau was sidelined for six weeks when Chicago's player slashed him with a hockey stick from behind. According to the book a player is to receive a match penalty when he swings his stick with intent to injure. Anyone who hits a player hard enough to break his ankle isn't poke-checking.

The same thing happened to Elmer Lach a few weeks later and again there was no such thing as match or minor penalties. Last year Syd Abel of the Hawks broke Lach's thumb and at the time there were a lot of people claiming that the injury was deliberate. A few weeks ago when Beliveau returned to the Canadiens lineup he received a broken jaw under rather suspicious looking circumstances. Beliveau was standing in front of the Rangers net waiting for a pass. Jack Evans of the Rangers crashed into him from behind and Bower, the Ranger goalie hit him with the butt end of his stick. Some people said Bower did it unconsciously, others said it was deliberate. Whatever it was there was no penalty. These incidents aren't Campbell's fault directly but they do merit an investigation by him.
