**IMPORTANT NOTICE OF EXPRESS EMBARGO**

Effective immediately, on account of the possible work stoppage on Canadian National Railway lines in Canada, Canadian Pacific Railway, and Napierville Junction Railway due to the current labour dispute, an embargo is placed on all carload and less carload express shipments of livestock, live poultry and other perishable goods, motion picture films, explosives and other dangerous articles, gold and silver bullion, and currency which cannot, with reasonable certainty, reach its destination in Canada or be transferred to a connecting United States carrier by Sunday noon, February 1, 1953. Other shipments will be accepted subject to delay.
