At the Y. M. C. A. last night Mr. Louson delivered, principally for the benefit of the young people of the community, his lecture on the beauty spots of Prince Edward Island, using as illustrations, his beautiful photographs, adapted for the stereopticon. The pictures were splendidly reproduced, and were an education of themselves—not only in the art of photography, but in the study of the natural beauty which is so plentifully bestowed on this favored section of the Dominion. First thrown upon the screen was a picture of spring, a little child playing beneath the blossoms laden branches of an apple tree. Then followed summer, autumn, and winter. Next, to the accompaniment of welcoming cheers, was the portrait of His Worship Mayor Paton, Charlottetown's popular Mayor. The lecturer at this point, while paying a tribute to the City Council for their advancement in all things pertaining to the Civic welfare, pointed out the necessity of providing decent and sufficient bathing house accommodation at the Park, so that the young people might enjoy the pleasure of a dip in the ocean, amid the natural beauties surrounding them. The Tourist Association, he said has done much in the line of development and improvement, and he thought every citizen should be allowed the privilege to contribute to the funds of the association. Then came some beautiful views of the Park, and of the men-of-war in the harbor. Here the lecturer diverged a little, while he threw on the screen a portrait of the late Albert W. Mitchell, to whose quiet influence as a good citizen he paid eulogy. Of Mr. Mitchell's ability as a photographer he spoke highly, and showed a fine photo taken by him, representing First Communion at the Congregation de Notre Dame. While this picture was being shown the children present sang "In the Sweet Bye and Bye." Then came views in and around Charlottetown, and lots of them, and also of all sections of the Island, east and west, so that no place was overlooked. For variety, some views of northern New Brunswick were given, showing mountain scenery in its grandeur. Last, as illustrating the possibilities afforded in our own "Home Sweet Home" for pleasure excursions, a picture of Captain Stephen Moore, the well-known yachtsman, and good fellow, was shown presiding over the preparations for a meal at Holland Cove, in the "good old summertime" when holidays were the order of the day.
