GOLDEN WEDDING. Mr. and Mrs. P. W. Robinson, of Brackley Point Road, celebrated their golden wedding on the evening of the 27th ult. The celebration took place at their residence at Brackley Point, and there were about fifty couples present. Speech-making, music and song were the means by which several hours were most enjoyably passed. During the evening an address of congratulation to the happy couple was read, and acknowledged in fitting terms. A BIG SCHEME.—A big scheme is afoot in the Annapolis Valley, no less a project in fact than the lighting of the whole Valley by electricity. A company has already been formed with that end in view having for its head the Hon. the Minister of Militia. It is proposed to generate the power at the head-waters of the Gasperau river, where a maximum of 500 horse power is always obtainable, and to distribute the current at a point near Port William station. Wires will be carried from Windsor to Annapolis with branches to all the outlying towns in the Valley. Power will be supplied to all parties requiring it, the houses and barns of farmers lighted and street lights provided in all the towns between its terminals. \$400,000 is the capital required, the bulk of which will be supplied, by Montreal capitalists.

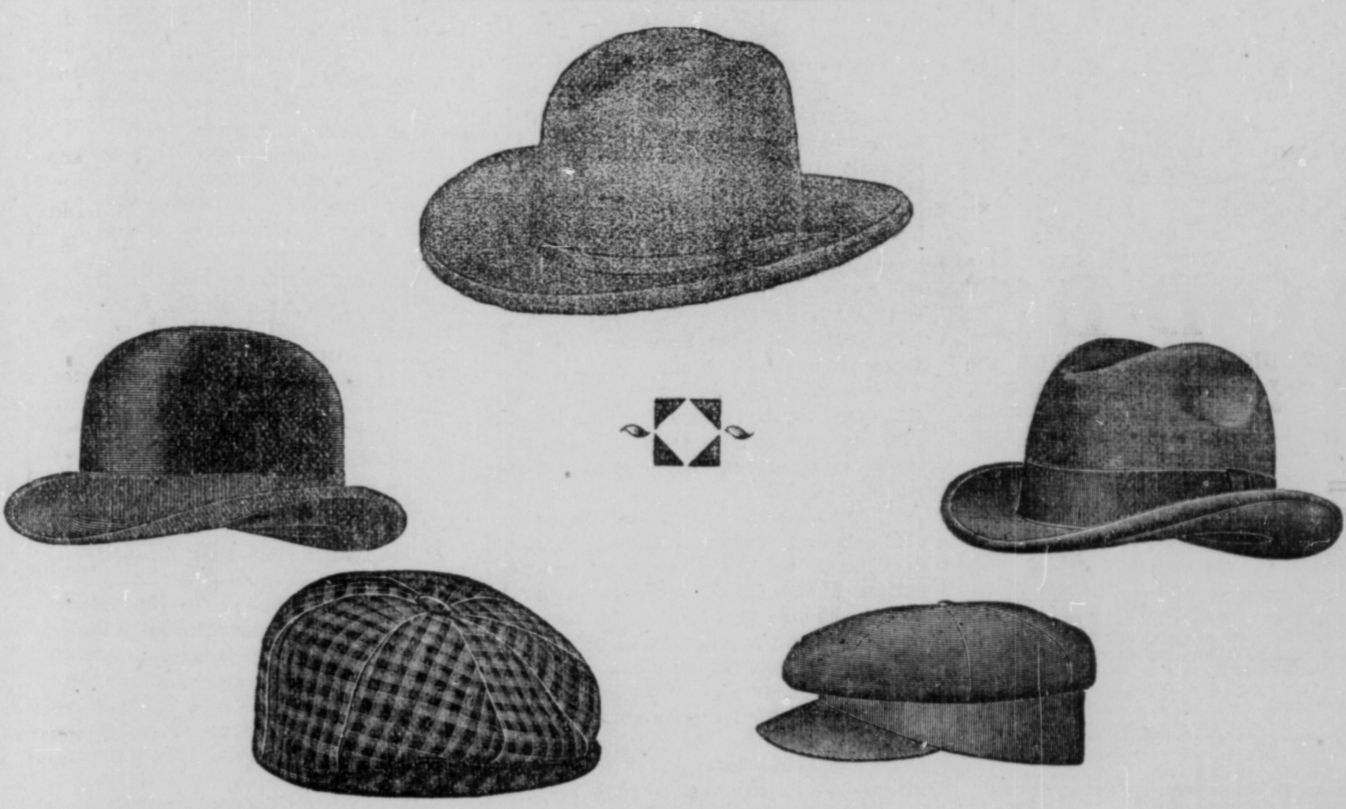
