Body of Elderly Man Discovered

The body of Charles Thistle, aged 70, was found yesterday morning in the woods close to Brookfield, about ten miles from Charlottetown. The elderly man had been the object of a search by R.C.M.P. since his disappearance after leaving the home of Roy Moore, Brookfield, on the evening of February 4 after having supper at the Moore home. The body was located by two residents of the district who had been co-operating with the police in the search.

Coroner L. E. Prowse, who was called to view the body, after learning the circumstances surrounding the death of the man, decided that an inquest would be unnecessary. The late Mr. Thistle is not known to have any immediate relatives. It is understood that he had formerly resided at St. Peter's Bay before coming to Charlottetown in December, 1954.

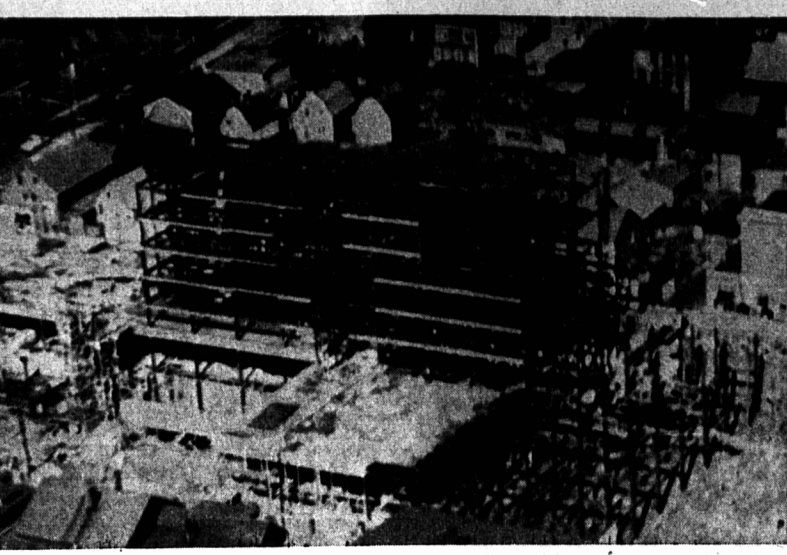

Tudor, an illiterate laborer, was found in his deserted home with his head smashed in. He had been dead as long as 16 months.

McCull-Fonteneau Earnings Increase

MONTREAL, (CP) - Earnings of McCull-Fonteneau Oil Company in the first quarter of this year were ahead of earnings for the corresponding period of 1953, president T. C. Twyman said Wednesday at the company's annual meeting.

After all charges, including taxes and preferred dividends, the company earnings in the first quarter amounted to \$2,299,738, or 88 cents a share. This compared with \$1,688,397, or 65 cents a share in the first three months of 1954.

Arctic Portion

Ellesmere island in the Canadian Arctic was named after Lord Ellesmere, former president of the Royal Geographic Society.

The report, for the year ended Sept. 30, says that germanium, a rare mineral used in electronics, would be a by-product of the operation.

Exploration at Meek Cove, the report states, is furthest advanced, but a wide belt of mineralization in the Rocky Brook Cheticamp area carrying copper, lead and zinc with some precious metals, had also been discovered. Little work had been done on it to date.

Ellesmere island in the Canadian Arctic was named after Lord Ellesmere, former president of the Royal Geographic Society.

The report, for the year ended Sept. 30, says that germanium, a rare mineral used in electronics, would be a by-product of the operation.

Exploration at Meek Cove, the report states, is furthest advanced, but a wide belt of mineralization in the Rocky Brook Cheticamp area carrying copper, lead and zinc with some precious metals, had also been discovered. Little work had been done on it to date.
