Fine Aberdeen Angus Cattle Purchased By PEI Breeders

Prince Edward Island breeders were prominent purchasers at a recent dispersal sale of Aberdeen Angus cattle held recently at the Bailey Arena, Amherst, N. S. The stock was from the farm of Mr. W. L. Ham, Guelph, Ontario, one of the finest breeders of Aberdeen Angus cattle in Canada. Forty-four fine animals were brought to this Province.

Some 40 lots were disposed of by public auction at an average price of \$340 per lot. This was considered to be the highest price paid for all of Canada. A previous sale of stock from the same herd last spring brought a price of well over \$300 per lot.

The largest buyer was Mr. Hamilton G. Watts and Hamilton G. Watts Jr. of Hampshire who together purchased 23 head. Mr. Lorne Watts, another son purchased the second highest priced herd sire at the Spring sale. This animal has turned out to be a top notcher.

It is worthy of note that Mr. Watts Sr. who is now in his 86th year is the oldest Aberdeen Angus breeder in Canada and through out his life has always been a lover of high quality stock.

Other breeders who made purchases at the sale were: Parker Jewell, Little York; Fred Jewell, North River; Dr. J. P. Lantz, Kepoch; Wendell Barbour, Charlottetown; Redverse Stewart, New Wiltshire and A. H. Roper, Charlottetown.

Mr. L. W. Roper of the Federal Department of Agriculture, predicts a great future for what he states the best of breed of cattle. He states that the bulls of this breed will cross well that of other breeds and that at present there is a strong consumer demand for the high quality beef produced by the breed.

At a recent meeting of prospective Angus breeders in the Province the Aberdeen Angus Club of Prince Edward Island was formed. Named president of the organization was Mr. Hamilton Watts, Vice-president, Dr. J. P. Lantz, Secretary Parker Jewell.

Swedish Biochemist Given Nobel Prize For Medicine

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (Reuters)—A Swedish research scientist, whose overwork has earned him a severe case of stomach ulcers, found Thursday that hours in the laboratory paid off in a happier reward—the Nobel prize.

Prof. Hugo Theorell, a leading Swedish biochemist, was awarded the 1955 Nobel prize for medicine in recognition of his research into how the human body converts food into energy.

Theorell, an accomplished musician, who often plays the violin in his laboratory, has spent several years in probing nature's chemistry workings within the human body but he is better known to the man-on-the-street as the scientist who worked out blood tests used by Swedish police to detect drunken drivers.

Fellow-scientists said Thursday the 52-year-old professor is a world authority on enzymes—the fermenters which induce chemical changes in plant and animal life.

ACCOMPLISHED VIOLINIST

Theorell, head of the Nobel Institute of Biochemistry here, plans to spend the prize money of 190,214 crowns (about \$38,000) on a new apartment for his wife and three sons, and furnishings for their little log weekend cabin outside the city.

The Nobel winner is an honorary doctor of the Sorbonne in Paris, and a former Rockefeller scholarship holder.

Had it not been for his inability to stay out of the laboratory, he might have been a professional violinist.

He disclosed Thursday his music teacher had constantly urged him to become a professional musician.

The research for which he was honored Thursday started 21 years ago, when he succeeded in producing for the first time in pure form the so-called "yellow enzyme."

Three years ago he discovered a new antibiotic called protopain, used against tuberculosis. It is still being tested clinically and has not yet been used in therapy.

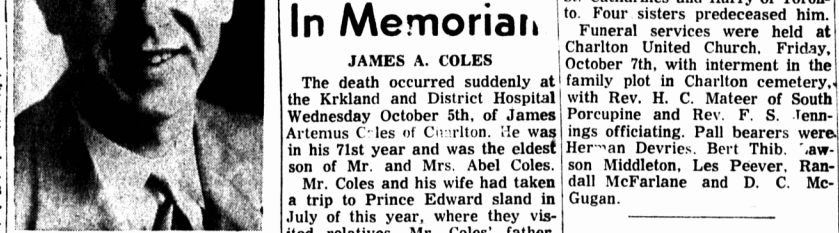
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James A. Coles
