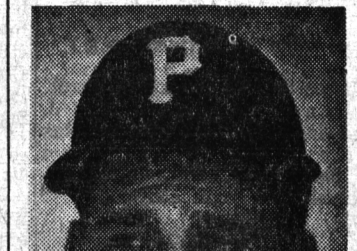

AL Attendance Is Down

By BEN OLAN Associated Press Sports Writer NEW YORK (AP)—The apathy of American League baseball fans and the enthusiasm of the followers of the Los Angeles Dodgers and San Francisco Giants are reflected in a survey of major league attendance figures.

The figures show a decrease for every American League club except the Washington Senators. The last-place team, which is reported eyeing Minneapolis as a new home for 1959, is only 10,000 ahead of last year's total.

Washington has a home attendance of 389,000—lowest in the majors. The Senators pulled 379,000 customers through the gate in comparable number of home dates in 1957.

YANKS' CROWDS DOWN The New York Yankees, on whom many observers put the finger for the drop in attendance, also have drawn less at Yankee Stadium than a year ago.
