He will leave Moncton and Saint John, N.B. the same day and will visit Meadham, N.B., and St. Andrews, N.B., before returning to Ottawa July 4.

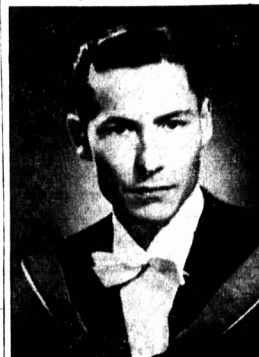


W. LLOYD SEAMAN FURTHER STUDY

TORONTO (CP) — A British cigarette firm with branches throughout the world has proposed to build a \$1,000,000 factory at nearby Newmarket, ultimately providing employment for 1,000. Rothman's of Pall Mall (Canada) Ltd., plans a plant of approximately 55,000 square feet on a 25-acre site.

Encouraging Support For P.E.I. Hospital Campaign

The announcement was made by J. David Stewart, at a meeting of the Special Gifts Committee of the Prince Edward Island Hospital campaign to raise \$250,000, held in the Game Room of the Armories, yesterday evening, that the men's groups making up the various committees of the Campaign have been greatly encouraged by the support and co-operation of both the Senior and Junior Ladies' Aid of the Hospital. Both groups together have pledged themselves to underwrite \$15,000.00 of the cost of the modernization and construction program. The Senior Group Group pledged \$10,000.00.

Mr. Stewart further stated that the gifts from both these Groups, who work quietly year in and year out for the Hospital, must be considered magnificent and a clear indication of a great humanitarian spirit on the part of these women. "As we men working for the campaign are only called upon once every ten years or so to contribute and work during a short period of time, the continued work and interest of the women's groups make our efforts small by comparison," Mr. Stewart said. "In addition to the money that they have underwritten, they have been well organized and integrated for many years, and there is hardly a day when some effort is not being put forth on their part in the Hospital to better the conditions of our sick."

"Two members of the Junior Aid make a tour of the Hospital every afternoon when books, confectionery and other items are made available for the convenience of patients in the Hospital. This service is looked forward to by many patients who are confined and provides a pleasant break in the monotony of confinement, particularly for those patients who are in bed. The sum total of \$15,000.00 does not give a true picture of their financial support, as they are always making some purchase of equipment or apparatus which the Hospital urgently needs from time to time.

ENCOURAGING GIFTS — In reviewing the progress of the Campaign to date, Mr. Stewart further stated that some encouraging gifts had been received. "The sum total of the Doctors' contributions to date amount to \$42,500.00 and their work is incomplete. In the Advance Gift Division of the Campaign, I am happy to report a gift of \$10,000.00 from the DeBlais Bros. a personal gift of \$5,000.00 from Alfred E. Pickard and an anonymous gift of \$5,000.00 from a former member of the Board."

"At the first report meeting of the Special Gift Division, under the chairmanship of Judge H. L. Palmer and Brig. G. G. Keake, a total of over \$9,000.00 was reported. As this total comprises a very limited number of gifts, this result is very encouraging and augurs well for the success of the Campaign. A more complete and comprehensive report by the Special Committee will take place on Wednesday afternoon at 5 o'clock.

"In view of the extraordinary challenge of raising \$250,000.00 and the fact that the finance program is on a basis of a three year pledge rather than a single cash gift, it is understandable that more time is required to impress upon the members the importance and magnitude of the campaign. I am hopeful, however, that, by the end of another week, we will be able to report a total that will indicate great progress on the way to the total goal."

Citizenship Adventure Subject Of Rotary Talk

In a concise and entertaining review of his activities while taking part in the "Adventure in Citizenship" project at Ottawa, sponsored by the Rotary Club of that city by the support in part by Rotary Clubs throughout Canada, Doug Cudmore, who represented Charlottetown, was guest speaker at the weekly luncheon at The Charlottetown Hotel yesterday.

"The purpose was to give future citizens a clearer and better outline of how our wonderful nation is controlled and how Ottawa, our national capital, functions," Mr. Cudmore said. "It seemed, when the 186 representative students from all parts of Canada, arrived at Ottawa that, because of their strangeness to each other they possessed only individual thoughts or ideas. However, almost immediately, they were made into a group, and each student appeared to be a walking travel bureau for his or her own province, and our thoughts became national rather than provincial."

"This broader aspect was of course enhanced by being in our capital city, Ottawa, and hearing nationally known members of Parliament and other outstanding citizens, speak on various subjects of interest and importance." Mr. Cudmore said.

"The sphere of thinking and observing was further broadened for the students when one of their luncheon meetings was addressed by an American Y.M.C.A. Secretary who had just returned from five-years experience in office in Africa, which gave us an international outlook on our adventure."

"Perhaps the most thrilling event of all the program was the tour to the Parliament Buildings, which included a visit to the Peace Tower, where a birds-eye view of Ottawa proved very interesting. We also

Lady Astor Denies That Her Family Had Been Pro-Nazi

LONDON (AP) — Lady Astor Monday denied that her family had been pro-Nazi or that they entertained a German spy at dinner in the edge days before the outbreak of the Second World War.

"It's absolute nonsense," said the wife of the late Viscount Astor, whose dinner parties for the diplomatic high-ups were a feature of European political life between the two world wars. She said the German who came to dinner was an anti-Nazi who as later was executed by the Germans and was by no means a spy.

Lady Astor was roused by a government report saying that a dinner party at her country home was reported to Hitler in detail by one of her German guests. The report said the German informed her that Lord Astor and his son were "markedly Germanophile."

The document is part of a series of papers on Hitler's foreign policy published by the government under the title Last Months of Peace. Most of the material comes from captured German papers.

PARTY MENTIONED — One part of the report mentions a dinner party given by the Astors at which Lord Halifax, then foreign secretary, and Lord Lothian, later British ambassador in Washington, talked over ways and means of heading off war.

Adam von Trott zu Solz, a young German who went to college with the Astors' son, was present at the dinner and reported the conversation in detail to Berlin.

Lady Astor indignantly denied the pro-Nazi implication. "I was invited to Germany shortly before the war and was pressed by Hitler's immediate underlings to see him," she said. "But I steadfastly refused. The same thing happened in Italy. I refused to see Mussolini."

Tanker Damaged In Grounding

HALIFAX (CP) — The tug Foundation Vera pulled the tanker Irvingbrook free of a shoal near the harbor mouth here Monday, about two hours after she grounded.

The 12,500-ton vessel, drawing 26 feet of water when she struck the submerged sandbar, was en route to St. John, N.B., with gasoline and other petroleum products.

She was towed to a nearby cove where divers began an assessment of underwater damage. Their findings were not available.

The National Harbors Board officials said the Irvingbrook would not be allowed to re-enter the harbor until they were assured a leak, apparently sprung in the ship's gasoline tanks during the grounding, was repaired.

Tanker Damaged In Grounding
