

# Two Seeded Canadians Fall Before Foreigners

QUEBEC (CP)—Two of Canada's seeded men's singles players fell before foreign entries in third-round play Wednesday at the Canadian tennis championships.

The losers were Davis Cupper Francois Godbout of Waterloo, Que., defeated by Mexico's Antonio Palafox, and Montreal's Jack Harit who went down to Jack Frost of Monterey, Calif.

Bob Bedard of Sherbrooke, Que., and Don Fontana, of Toronto—the first and second Canadian seeds—remained in the running.

The Godbout - Palafox match was one of the highlights of play on the third sun-drenched day at the week-long tournament.

**DOGGED COMEBACK**  
The Mexican, seeded first among the foreign entries, had the Canadian off balance, breezed through the first set 6-1, and forged a 4-2 lead in the second. Then Godbout staged a dogged comeback that electrified the 200

spectators.  
Godbout won his own service twice and broke Palafox's twice. He turned on a perfect passing shot and handled the Mexican's hot service well. But in the final set, after each player won two games on service, Palafox broke through the Canadian's serve in the fifth game and went on to win 6-2.

Frost, seeded fourth among the foreign entries, was good in all departments as he downed Harit the third Canadian seed 6-2, 6-3.

Whitney Reed, second foreign seed from Alameda, Calif., staged another crowd-pleaser as he defeated Eduardo Zuleta, an unseeded 22-year-old from Ecuador, 6-3, 1-6, 6-1.

Bedard and Fontana posted their wins over the two Australian players competing in the men's singles.  
Bedard advanced into the quarter-final round with a 6-0, 6-3 win over Russell in a match that was tighter than the score indicated.

Russell, 22, unleashed a blistering service throughout the contest but Bedard played a strong game and seldom made an error.  
After the match Bedard said: "I played as good a game as I've ever played. Russell should have won about half the games in the first set."

**FONTANA WINS**  
John Sharpe, another 22-year-old Aussie, was bested by Toronto's Don Fontana, the second-ranked Canadian, 6-3, 6-1. Fontana's service was working smoothly and he was moving up to the forecourt and getting off point-counting overhead smashes.  
Sharpe and Russell were the seventh and eighth foreign seeds in the competition.

Fourth-seeded Henri Rochon of Montreal also gained the quarter-final round with a 6-0, 6-1 over Hubert Gaumond, Montreal.

Reynaldo Garrido of Cuba's Davis Cup team got a tough battle with durable Quebec veteran Jacques Giguere before taking the match 6-4, 6-4. Garrido is ranked fifth among the foreign entries.

**WOMEN'S ACTION**  
In women's play today, two seeded Canadians went down before the attack of outside players.  
Victoria's Susan Butt, the fourth seed, put up a game battle but lost 8-6, 6-3 to Mexico's statesque M. A. R. Hernandez the third-seeded outsider.

Toronto's Louise Brown, third-seeded Canadian, lost 6-4, 7-5 to Nell Hopman, wife of Australia's Davis Cup team coach and the sixth foreign seed.

Eleanor Dodge, the top Canadian and the defending champion, and Dorothy Head Knode of Panama both won their third-round matches. Miss Dodge set back Quebec's Simone Jolicoeur 6-3, 6-0 and Mrs. Knode won 6-4, 6-1 over Sherbrooke's Ana Bedard.

All games in the week-long tournament are being played on the clay courts of the Civil Employees Tennis Club.

## Sox, Browns Tie For First

# Sonny Liston Knocks Out Nino Valdes In 3rd Round

CHICAGO (AP)—Sonny Liston, No. 3 ranked heavyweight, loosed a vicious barrage to score a third round knockout of Nino Valdes in the Chicago Stadium Wednesday night.

Liston, winning his 18th fight in a row, stunned Valdes with a left hook to the jaw. While Valdes was staggering, trying to gain his equilibrium, Liston pummeled him with a left-right combination, felling him with a six-ounce right smash.

The victory gave Liston a solid

hit in his bid for a crack at heavyweight champion Ingemar Johansson's crown.

The knockout came in 47 seconds of the third round, Liston, a 5-1 favorite, started slowly.

Two officials, referee Beriaie Weissman and judge Frank Clark, called the first round even. The other judge, Howard Walsh gave the first round to Valdes 5-4.

The second round appeared a loss-up, but Weissman and Clark

gave it to Liston 5-4 while Walsh called it even, 5-5.

Both fighters came into the ring at 211 pounds.  
Liston, one of the most vicious punchers in the ring today, seemed to explode all of a sudden in the third round.

His left hook which staggered Valdes didn't seem to travel more than a half-foot. Once Valdes was staggered, Liston closed in with sharp left-right combinations.

Valdes collapsed against the ropes after Liston's staggering at-

tack. The big Cuban slumped to the canvas and vainly tried to climb back onto his feet after referee Weissman had counted ten.

It was Liston's 25th victory in 26 fights, including 16 by the knockout route.
