## EDUCATIONAL HORIZONS

### Teacher - Employer Link Must Reflect High, Status

The fourth series in our P.E.I. T.F. Code of Ethics series deals with Teacher-Employer relationship. This has been prepared by Douglas Nichol, teacher, West Kent School, Charlottetown.

We are members of one of the truly great professions in our nation. Perhaps our professional status, for one reason or another, is not so high as it should be, but one of ways in which we ourselves can attempt to improve the respect and the status we do have is to adopt a Code of Ethics of a lofty, moral, spiritual, and intellectual standard, thus demonstrating the deep and sincere concern we possess regarding education and its problems. Of course, professing a certain code or code is one matter; we must abide by its impositions and limitations as well.

This topic in our group will be prepared to make many comments on it.

### THROUGH CHANNELS

The first item under this heading states that "the teacher will apply for positions only through the proper channels and only on the basis of competence." Now, the "proper channel," I assume, is the secretary of the local school board. From both the teacher's and the employer's viewpoint, I should imagine that making a proper application would facilitate business proceedings. A proper application would possibly consist of a letter of application in the teacher's own handwriting, which would cover his qualifications, his experience, and his interests. Perhaps it would be well to mention only those special interests which the teacher is prepared to make use of in his teaching. Copies of Inspectors' or Superintendents' Reports and several references would also be included.

Once an appointment has been accepted, it should be kept, with the possible exception of times when extremely extenuating situations arise. By making only a proper application and by up-

holding his part of the agreement of employment, a teacher can do a great deal to enhance his position as a professional member of the community and to ensure respected treatment and consideration from the School Board.

The second item states that "the teacher will refuse to accept or apply for a position when the vacancy exists as the result of unfair practices on the part of the School Board or its agents." I would like to consider this item together with the third one, which states that "the teacher refrain from knowingly under-bidding fellow applicants for a position, and will not apply for or accept a position before such position has become vacant."

If we desire to be considered professional people, practicing professional procedures in our dealings is vital. It is obvious that the procedures outlined in the two last items are definitely unprofessional; following such practices would undermine all gains we make in improving our status. We must present a solid front; solidarity should be our primary aim. Solidarity, present when we organize ourselves into a federation such as the Prince Edward Island Teachers' Federation, is the most powerful means we have of asserting our opinions on a matter of salary, status, conditions, and the like.

In cases where teaching conditions and situations have become so deplorable that stringent action has been deemed necessary, this solidarity has proved most effective and instrumental in correcting faults. Thus, by employing such devices as those suggested previously in obtaining a position, besides injuring his own professional reputation, which he most certainly does, a teacher undermines the status of the entire profession. I wonder how effective it would be to bar a teacher who has gained a position through such means from membership in our professional organization.

However, it is quite possible that a teacher may unknowingly accept a position when the vacancy is not really in existence or when the vacancy exists because of unfair practices. To prevent the possibility of this occurring, the Federation might be persuaded, if it does not involve a prohibitive amount of time or money, to prepare and issue a list of vacancies which exist in P.E. Island indicating any which are the result of unfair practices on the part of the School Board in question, and which, therefore, should not be applied for.

that "the teacher will engage in no gainful employment, outside of his contract, where the employment affects adversely his professional status or impairs his standing with students, associates, and community." None of us would want to have the feeling that for any of our fellow teachers, his teaching duties receive second consideration to other matters. Yet, that may be idealistic as long as our level of salaries remains low. All of us, I'm sure, have to keep a tight rein on our expenses in these days of serious inflation, if we are to keep ourselves solvent during the summer months of "unemployment," as I prefer to call them. Such matters as family responsibilities, summer school attendance, and the like are added drains on our restricted incomes. To endorse such a creed as this is certainly desirable; perhaps it is also a lever we can use on our efforts to improve our financial position.

We are, as I have said before, members of one of the most vital professions in Canada. There are no ifs, ands, or buts about it. It is undoubtedly true, no matter how we wish to improve our status but we can accept the challenge of educational problems, face them squarely, and attempt to solve them. In all our dealings and associations, whether in school or out, we must—and we all will—as the fifth item states "accept our obligations to the profession for maintaining a professional level of service." Let us prove our regard, respect, and thus our status.
