PRESIDENT WILL BE DELEGATE

Annual District Convention Of North Prince In Session

ALBERTON — The annual district convention of the Women's Institute of the North Prince area was held in the Alberton Institute Hall yesterday afternoon and evening with the Alma Institute presiding.

The afternoon session was conducted by Mrs. Archie Barbour with Mrs. Jack Clark as secretary. The hall was beautifully decorated with apple blossoms. Mrs. Wallace Donald graciously welcomed the visiting ladies and a fitting response was made by Mrs. Alvin Wilkie.

The roll call showed representatives from the following institutes, Alberton, Alma, Brooklyn, Dock, Elmsdale, Fortune Cove, Mill River, Montrose, O'Brien Road, Rosebank, South Kildare and St. Lawrence.

Reports from six of the institutes were then given showing a great variety of activities including special speakers at the schools during Education Week, improvements for the school grounds, extra supplies and Christmas treats for scholars, knitting and sewing for Red Cross and donations to charitable causes. Mrs. Callaghan gave a report on the present standing of the local scholarship fund.

EDUCATION STRESSED
A fine paper on "Education — a family responsibility" — was read by Mrs. Ralph Fraser. This was a very informative paper and showed that no educational system or law of the land can produce the best citizens, if in the home children are taught disrespect toward those in authority in school, church and government. A home where all teachers and leaders are criticized and held in contempt cannot produce children with open and receptive minds to accept the teaching available to them no matter how fine the educational system may be.

Mrs. Leslie Ramsay, third provincial vice-president, stressed the responsibilities of each institute to the institute itself and to the cultural activities sponsored by it.

The provincial president, Mrs. Lloyd Wilkie, was called to the front of the hall at this time and an address was read by Mrs. Keith Gard of Mill River expressing the pleasure and pride of the institute members of this convention area in the fact that the provincial president is from this area and that she has had the honor to be chosen as a delegate to attend the C.W.W. convention in Scotland.

Mrs. Lloyd Wilkie, provincial president, then spoke briefly on institute matters and introduced the visiting speakers. She also thanked the institutes of this area for choosing her as their delegate to the conference at Edinburgh, Scotland.

Miss Jean Gillis, assistant supervisor, then spoke on the theme of the convention and gave many worthwhile suggestions for projects to be carried out in the institutes. She also gave a preview of the good things in store for those who will attend the provincial convention. Miss Gillis stressed the importance of 4-R garment clubs and the handicraft van.

FABRIC DEMONSTRATION
A demonstration on fabrics was given by Miss Margaret Jean MacDonald who is the home economics student who received the home economics scholarship given by the P.E.I. women's institutes. She expressed her appreciation of the opportunity afforded her by this scholarship and thanked the members for their contributions to this fund and assured them that she will do her best to be worthy of their support and make the best of her opportunity. Miss MacDonald gave many valuable facts about fabrics which will help her hearers to choose wisely when buying fabrics or garments.

All joined in a lively sing-song led by Miss MacDonald with Mrs. Cameron at the piano. The remaining institutes then gave their reports and as the first group had done they reported an amazing amount of work done for school and community and expressed pleasure in the social time enjoyed at their meetings as well.

A very humorous reading was given at this time by Mrs. Harold Horne of Mill River and provided a welcome break in the business of the session. The president then thanked all who had contributed to the success of the afternoon session. A delicious supper was served between sessions by the ladies of several institutes.

Queens County Magistrate Hears Profusion Of Cases

The case of a resident of Pleasant Grove charged with having care and control of a motor vehicle while intoxicated was adjourned until Monday, June 15th at the request of counsel for the defence.

The accused appeared before Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet, Q.C. in Queen's County Magistrate's Court yesterday. Appearing on similar charges of having the unlawful possession of intoxicating liquor in a place other than their respective residences, two residents of Charlottetown and one of Canyave were each fined \$20 and costs or 15 days.

A Parkdale youth was remanded until Wednesday, June 17th on a charge of indecent assault on a female. The remand was given in order that the accused might acquire legal representation.

For being intoxicated in a public place two residents of North Rustico were each fined \$20 and costs or 15 days.

Convicted of failing to stop at a stop sign a resident of North Rustico and one from North Millston were each fined \$5 and costs or five days.

A resident of Brackley Point Road and one from Carleton Place pleaded guilty to a charge of speeding and were each fined \$10 and costs or five days.

Charged with permitting a traction engine to be driven on the highway not registered for the current year, a resident of Cornwall and a resident of Mount Stewart were each fined \$10 and costs or five days.

A resident of Bonshaw was fined \$10 and costs or five days when he appeared on a charge of permitting his trailer to be driven on the highway not being registered for the current year.
