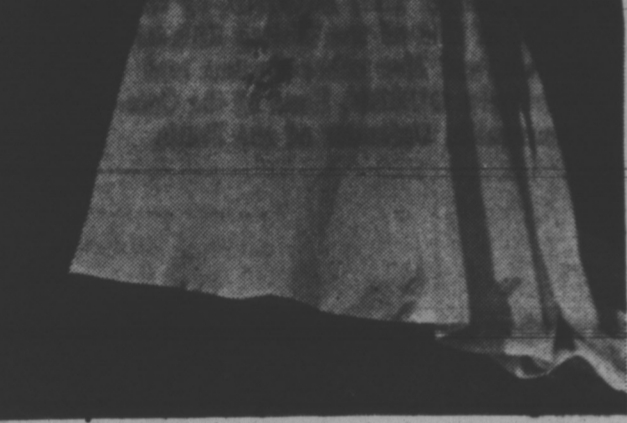

MAGGIE'S LUNCHEON MENU 111
(as promised)
Steak with Seasoned Butter
Shoestring Potatoes
Cauliflower Vinaigrette
Rolls Soft Margarine
Lanilla Ice Cream with Hot Spiced Applesauce
Coffee Chocolates
Measurements level
VINAIGRETTE DRESSING
(For Asparagus or Cauliflower Salad)
3-3 c. cider vinegar or wine vinegar
3 c. safflower oil
2 tsp. salt
1 tsp. dry mustard
1/4 tsp. fresh-ground pepper
3 tbsp. India relish
3 tbsp. chopped olives
3 hard-cooked eggs, sieved
Mix all ingredients in jar which can be covered tight. It will keep stored in refrigerator for several weeks. Makes about 1 qt.

SEASONED BUTTER
(For Steaks or Fish Fillets)
Ingredients: 1 tsp. basil, 1/4 tsp. powdered tarragon, 2 tsp. chopped parsley, a whiff of cayenne, 1/2 c. butter.

To Prepare: Combine ingredients and stir-heat until butter is just melted. Makes 1/4 c.

APPLESAUCE-CHERRY - PIE
(As Promised)
1 frozen 9" pie crust shell
1 pkg. cherry whipped-dessert mix
1/2 c. milk
1/4 c. canned applesauce
1/4 tsp. ground nutmeg
1/4 c. heavy cream, whipped and sweetened
Bake pie crust shell following pkg. directions. Cool.
Beat the whipped-dessert mix with milk in deep bowl of mixer 2 min. or until thick. Add 1/2 c. of applesauce and nutmeg; beat 2 min. Fold in remaining apple sauce. Spoon into cooled, baked pie crust shell. Refrigerate 1 hr. or until firm. Top with whipped cream.
